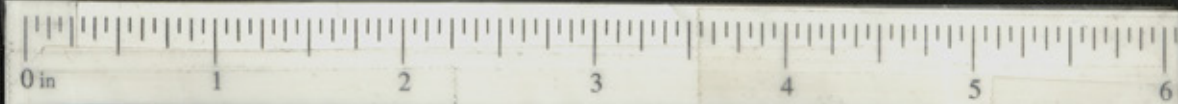

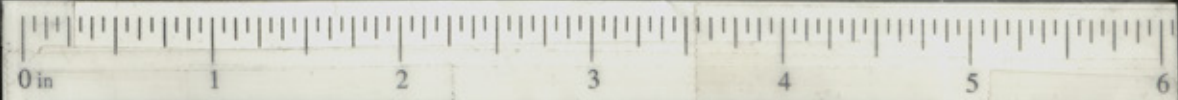

had some business to attend to.

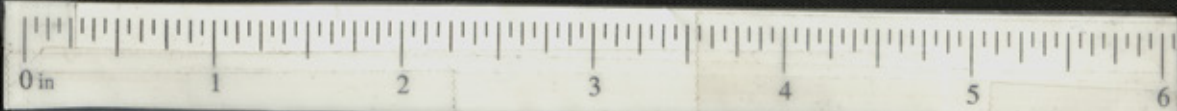
Soon after I arrived here,² ^{in New York} }

Dear Brother:- I have your kind favor of Dec. 5th. relating to the Sunday question. I had written you a letter on the subject which you have probably received since writing. I do not imagine that your views differ in the least from my own. The address which I have revised on behalf of the Committee (and the revision was accepted unanimously to-day) will be mailed [#] to you for you to sign, if you see fit, and with the great desire on the part of the Committee and our association that you will take it in person to Gen. Sherman, and if possible secure his signature. The address is to go to the different posts of the Grand Army, to the different local bodies of the Loyal Legion, to the Sons of Veterans, etc., etc. —, all the patriotic orders, and will be accompanied by a letter asking these local bodies to petition the Commissioners each in its own state, asking that they (the Commissioners) vote against the opening of the Columbian Fair on Sunday. #

Such an opening would necessitate ^{the} constant employment of some 50,000 persons in the ordinary avocations of the week, depriving them of their Sabbath as a day of rest and as a day of worship. It would necessitate almost, or would be taken as necessitating, Sunday excursions by railroad and by boat. This would deprive thousands of other employes of their proper Sabbath. It would gratify all the salcon

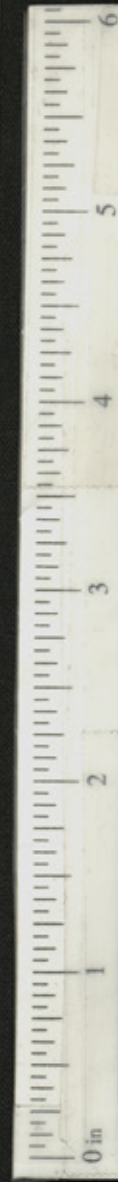

Please inform me by telegraph when you leave the limits of the United States, so that I may exercise the necessary command of your Division while you are beyond those limits.

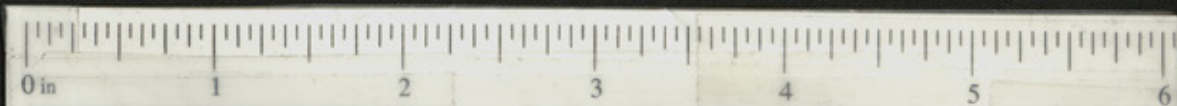
