My dear General

I have the honor to ask  
your influence with the Secretary of War  
to have my troop ordered to the National  
Park. Secretary Noble has asked for  
a troop in place of the Park garrison  
ordered into the field against hostile  
Indians. I was defeated in my last  
attempt to obtain Command of the  
Park by the consideration of expense.  
Under present circumstances this will  
be of less moment. In default of getting  
detailed for the Park it is my earnest  
desire to be ordered to General Miles  
Command in the field. which will  
give me a ground of vantage from  
which to recur to the original pro-  
position when hostilities have ceased.







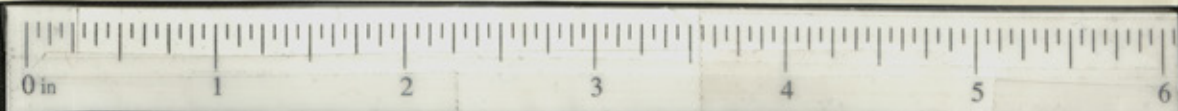

Hong Kong before 1<sup>st</sup> Jan'y.

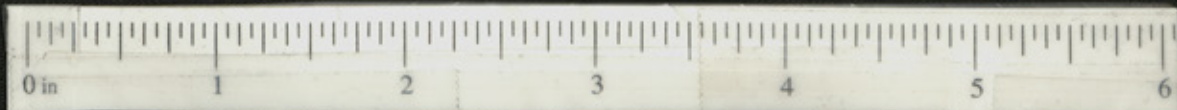
I had a letter from

I desire to issue a thoroughly excellent account of the Life of Sitting Bull and the present Indian War, giving a good description also of the present condition of the Indian Race.

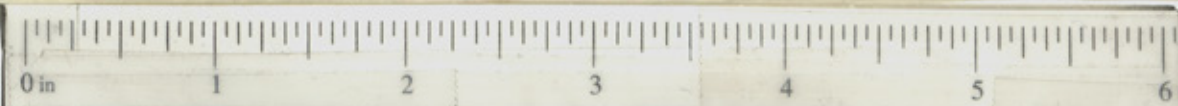

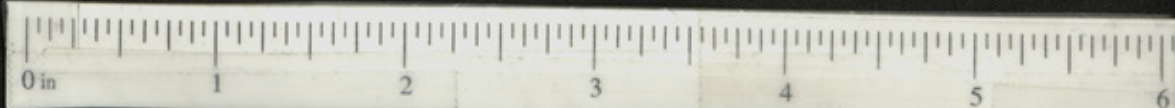
A recent article in the N.Y. Tribune
