## EXTRACTS FROM THE CONSTITUTION.

II. *BASIS*—The basis of this American Sabbath Union is the Divine authority and universal and perpetual obligation of the Sabbath, as manifested in the order and constitution of nature, declared in the revealed will of God, formulated in the Fourth Commandment of the Moral Law, interpreted and applied by our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, transferred to the Christian Sabbath, or Lord's Day, by Christ and his Apostles, and approved by its beneficent influence upon personal and national life.

III. *OBJECT*—The object of the American Sabbath Union is to preserve the Christian Sabbath as a day of rest and worship; and for that purpose to gather and diffuse information, to publish documents, to use the press, to cause public addresses to be made, and to use such other means as shall be expedient and proper.


