Though personally
unknown to you - your
name as a great soldier, and

mine. Four years ago I
came abroad to look after the
musical studies of my
daughter. A severe illness
has kept me here till now.
Now however I am again
able to travel and we
hope this summer to reunite
our little family at home.

But, at the last moment it
looks as if circumstances
beyond our control may de-
prive ^{us} of that happiness.

My husband Lieut Colonel
Cazare, 2nd Artillery, writes
me that, instead of believing
Capt. Hamilton at Newport
there is a strong possibility
of ~~my~~ his being ordered, in
his promotion, to join one
of the Galleries at York Barron.
If this be true - or only a
rumor - I know not, because
the distance is too great for
me, at yet, to have heard more.
But if it be the case, we
must abandon the hope of
having our family together
again. For though I could be
with my husband, at any of
the other Stations of the

Regiment, I cannot live in
Boston Harbour because both

family are forbidden to risk
the Climate there - on account
of lung and throat troubles.


