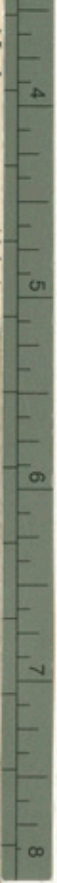
My dear General Howard:

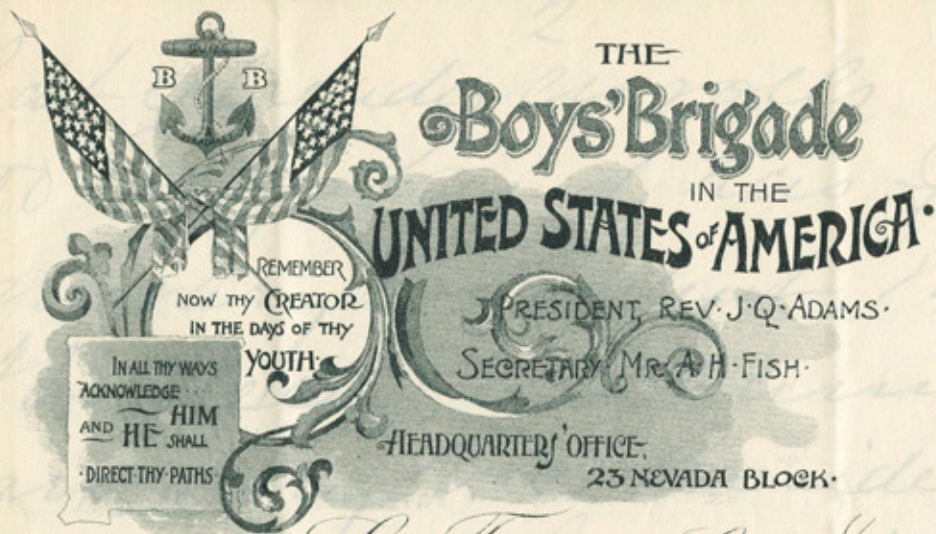
It is twenty six years, since

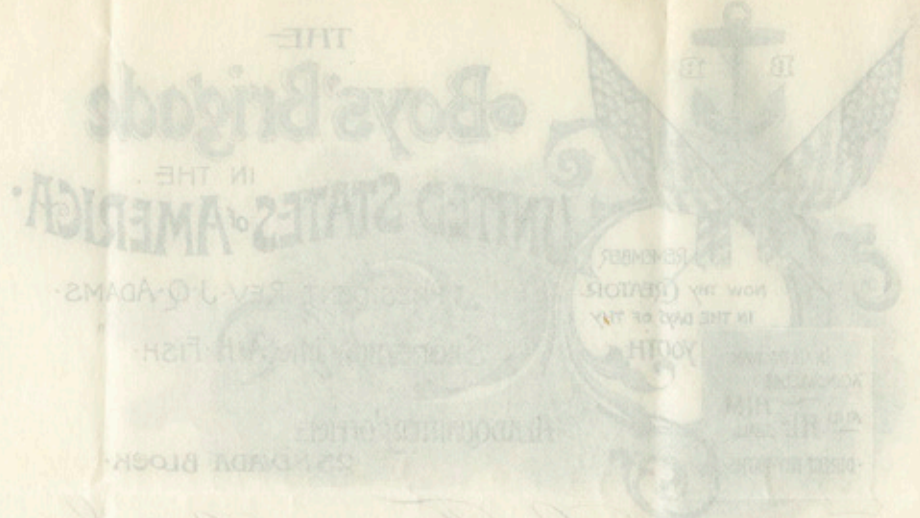
Dear Sir:
