Dear Sir,

Being unknown to you, the liberty I take in this communication can be excused only by the similarity of our present work - that of placing on record the truths of history and perpetuating the patriotism and heroism of the Anglo-American - you - in book form - I on canvas. More than fifteen years ago I commenced the study of the battle of San Jacinto and some two years ago began the work of placing on the final canvas, the data gleaned in the preceding years.

But though I labored conscientiously, yet have I failed to secure all the authority desirable. The "missing link" however I believe you can furnish, It is authority for my representations of the uniforms of the Mexican Soldier at the time (1836) of the battle of San Jacinto. The

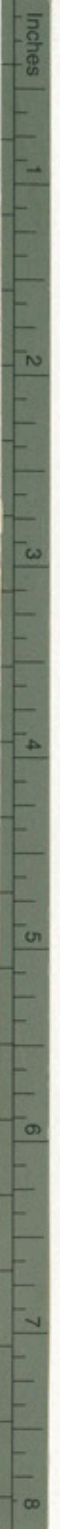

Used description is by my friend  
Capt Reuben M. Potter of your Army in a  
communication to me from Fort Wood,  
Bedloe's Island in 1874. He was at Matamoras  
when the Mexicans under Filisola retreated  
after the defeat and capture of Santa Anna;  
and a few weeks afterwards visited the  
Alamo in company with Col. Juan N. Seguin,  
for the purpose of studying the scene and  
character of the butchery of the preceding  
6<sup>th</sup> of March. Of the correctness of this  
description I have no doubt - but it is  
desirable to have some higher or more  
official authority. Permit me to present  
my meaning in a different form,

Years ago I painted a picture repre-  
senting Gen. Lee being restrained from  
leading a brigade at the battle of the  
Wilderness; In the foreground I represen-  
ted fire among the dead leaves and  
undergrowth. The critics pronounced  
the work very fine, but that in order  
to make it dramatic - I had taken  
undue license, that no such fire existed  
<sup>what</sup> was I to do? - I at once wrote to Genl.  
G. S. Hancock who most graciously  
replied by forwarding to me a
