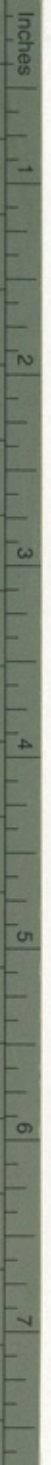

ation from which all the expenses of Memorial Day are paid.

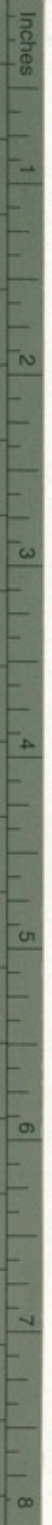
Our custom is to pay the travelling expenses of the Orator
