If you accept you will be called upon to address, one or more Sunday Schools & the Y. M. C. A. - You will be the guest of the Committee.

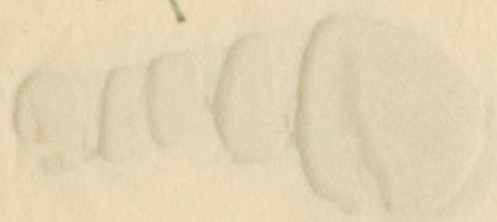

Gen. O. O. Howard,

Green's Island, N. J. H.

Dear Sir:

Your favor of the 12th inst.
at hand. I shall be pleased to attend
to your matter for as soon as possible;
but it may take some time. The land is
40 miles or more from where I am, and
I am in constant charge of 3 Camps
of some 135 men and 350 horses
at work on Canal work for the New Co.
Land Co.

I want to see the land myself before
making a report, instead of trusting to
anybody else. But it may take some
time for me to do that. I shall have
to make a special trip to do it. If you
will only have patience with me I will
accomplish what I want.

My family is still at Sussex. I shall
not move them at present; but wait until
I see what the chances are likely to be
for me here. Have been in Camp
since March 7th; and am in good
health and spirits. If I had taken
the Cavalry 18 years ago, and kept
in the field, instead of sitting around
garrison in the East and elsewhere it
would have been much better for me.

The life here is rough, and the
associations not particularly refined,
but I rather like it, nevertheless, and
as it pays me well, am satisfied
to keep at it for the present at least.
