Monsieur le Général,

La soirée d'hier j'ai passée (voilà où l'on en est réduit pour ne pas commencer par le pronom de la première personne) avec Meyerholz. J'avais annoncé ma visite huit jours à l'avance, pour être sûr de le trouver à la maison. Francisco, informé de mon dessein, me donna une lettre pour lui. Nous causâmes deux heures. Quand je rentrai dans ma chambre à dix heures et demie je tirai brusquement de ma poche la lettre que Francisco m'avait confiée; je reniais, pour la première fois, d'y penser.

Les conséquences immédiates de cet oubli furent désagréables au plus haut point. La lettre pouvait être pressée: d'ailleur j'avais promis de la remettre, et je ne voulais pas en avoir le démenté. Je me levai donc de grand matin pour remonter dans la ville haute. Il était six heures: il y avait longtemps que je n'avais vu la Bruxelles dans la fraîcheur matinale; le soleil ne dorait encore que les étages supérieurs des grandes maisons; il n'y avait que peu de personnes dans la rue; ces gens aussi, surtout les femmes avaient un air de fraîcheur inusité. Je me promenai pendant plus d'une heure, toutefois les rues se remplirent graduellement, mais rapidement, de lumière, de bruit et d'animation. Je pris le chemin de fer éléct., je trouvai le superintendent en manches de chemise, je remis la malheureuse lettre, à la lut (il y avait quatre pages), et je rentrai à pied, traversant le Parc, sortissant en ce moment, depuis la Musique, jusqu'à la Menagerie. Je venais de revenir et je pus écrire. Veuillez agréer M. le Général, l'expression de mes sentiments les plus respectueux G. D. Beck.
