Dear General Howard:-

I take pleasure in sending you the Year Book of the Young Men's Christian Associations for 1892. In it you will find a report of Association work in all parts of our country and in foreign lands. In sending this book I presume upon your interest in the work of the International Committee and would ask a subscription in aid of it.

AS an endorsement of our railroad work, we have just received a bequest of \$25,000 from Mr. Sidney Dillon of the Union Pacific Railroad, to be expended in work on the lines of that road. Over 400 college Associations are under the supervision of our college secretaries. The religious life of many American colleges has been entirely changed by our Association work; 2500 young men have been influenced to enter the Christian ministry; 5000 students have volunteered for foreign missions; 18,000 students have been led to accept Christ, and 40,000 active Christian young men have gone from these College Young Men's Associations into business and professional life.

The work in foreign lands is making satisfactory progress. In a few weeks a second secretary will go to India. We have now two secretaries in Japan, one in Brazil, and one in Mexico. The support of the brethren is secured independently of the contributions to the International work. In Paris we have \$160,000, and an Association building modeled after our best American buildings is in process of erection.

I enclose a blank pledge which I will be glad to have you fill.


that as You have so far engagements, these summer Sundays -
