Referring to our conversation on the train between Mauch
Chunk and Bethlehem, when I had the pleasure of meeting you,
I write to say that the question at issue between the War Department and the Bethlehem Iron Company is as to the interpretation of
the following extracts of the contract between the parties:-

"Thirty and one half (30-1/2) cents per pound, if the first set is delivered in twenty-four (24) months or in less than twenty seven (27) months from date of this contract.

"The remaining twenty two (22) sets to be delivered at the rate of twelve (12) sets every twelve (12) months, after the delivery of the first set, until the whole number contracted for is delivered."

We claim that we have, up to this time, complied with the contract and that no penalties have accrued. The Department contends that "twelve sets of forgings every twelve months" means one set each month, and that the Bethlehem Iron Company is liable to

the penalty as prescribed in the contract of 2/10 cent per pound for each month's delay in delivery. We did, in fact, deliver the first 10" set within the contract time, and twelve sets in addition within the year thereafter, but not in 30-day periods. These forgings were paid for by the Government from time to time as delivered.

This question of penalties came up first about one year ago, in regard to the deliveries of the last four sets of 8" forgings, which were covered by the same contract. We had delivered eighteen sets in twelve months, in accordance with the terms of the contract, although not in periods of twenty days each, as now claimed by the Department. The remaining four sets to complete the 8" forgings were delivered, one set in July and three sets in August; and it was on these four sets of forgings that the dispute arose.

Under date of Sept. 24th, 1891, we wrote, dissenting from the views taken by the Department as to deducting penalties on these four sets, "and respectfully beg to in inquire whether the Department has any objection to our referring the question to the Secretary of War, as provided for in the last paragraph of Section 1 of the Contract". We have reply under date of October 20th, 1891, from the Inspector, as follows:-

Respectfully returned to the Bethlehem Iron Co., through the Inspector of Ordnance, U.S.A. The decision referred to within as that of the Chief of Ordnance is the decision of the Secretary of War in his 7th Endorsement, dated October 13th, 1891, on Ordnance Office file 4960 of 1891, which was forwarded to the Inspector of Ordnance at Bethlehem by the 8th endorsement dated Oct. 16, 1891 on same file. Subsequently when said file was again submitted to the Secretary, he simply reaffirmed his decision as given in the 7th endorsement. Notice of this re-affirmation was sent to the Bethlehem Company in letter dated Dec.16, 1891. As this decision was rendered on an appeal to the Secretary of War, as provided in the contract, it is conclusive as far as this Department is concerned. It is also stipulated in the contract that such a decision shall be final. The change asked for on the enclosed vouchers is therefore disapproved. Copies of the 7th and subsequent endorsements on Ordnance Office file 4960 of 1891, and of letter dated Dec.16, 1891, are enclosed. Charles Shaler, (Signed) Capt. Ord. Dept., W.S.A., Actg. Chief of Ordnance. The seventh endorsement, dated Oct. 15th, 1891, referred by Captain Shaler, is as follows: " WAR DEPARTMENT, Oct. 13, 1891. Respectfully returned to the Chief of Ordrance. It is clear to my mind that the delivery of the first set within fifteen months fixed the price at 27 1/3 cents, and that the non-delivery on time of subsequent sets renders them liable to the 2/10 of a cent deduction. The clause in the contract providing for the 2/10 deduction is not clear or easy of construction, but the last paragraph of the "Instructions to Bidders", made part of the contract, solves the uncertainty. This provides for a penalty stipulation of "2/10 of a cent per pound per month on the


