#### A Proposed Plan.

- 1. A Church Extension Congregational organization for the cities of New York and Brooklyn and the vicinity.
- 2. Its relation to the National societies to be independent, organically, but auxiliary to and in harmony with the work of each, whether of Church building, Mission, or Sunday school work.
- 3. Its basis, the individual Congregational Christian, of whatever Congregational church, who will contribute \$10. per year to the work, as a condition of membership, or \$100. for life membership. Persons not members of Congregational churches to be honorary members on like payment. Persons contributing \$500. at one time to be enrolled as patrons.

It is believed that the Lord's money, after all pleas for work on the national basis have been presented and answered, is yet to be obtained for local needs. These needs exist. For proof the writer of the accompanying letter will be glad to state the cases within his knowledge at this time.

Can one thousand persons be found who will contribute \$10. per year for such work, making a fund of \$10,000.?


The Rev. Dr. Storrs has pledged \$100. as a beginning. The Rev. Dr. Lyman has done the same, and several have promised contributions without stating amount.

4. The Management to be in the hands of those interested and contributing.

Proposed that there be twenty-three, or twenty-seven, directors, from the two cities in a fair proportion, to be elected at the annual meeting, and to go out of office in rotation. These directors to elect a president, vice-president, secretary, and treasurer, and to employ, if need be, a superintendent of the work.

The directors to appoint sub-committees from their number on each enterprise asking consideration, or which may be brought to their attention by the superintendent. This method has been so successful in Chicago for some years past.

- 5. The aggressive work of this nature now progressing in other cities, received the warm commendation of the able pastor of the Tompkins Avenue Church at a public meeting in that church in May last.
- 6. The foregoing plan, in part or whole is regarded with favor, by the gentlemen named in the accompanying letter. Portions of it are suggested by one or other of them.



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


