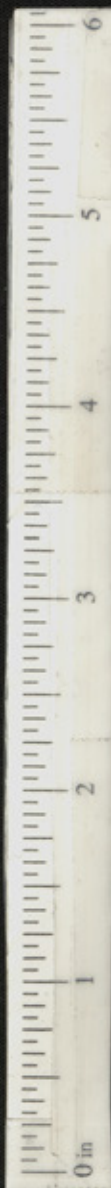

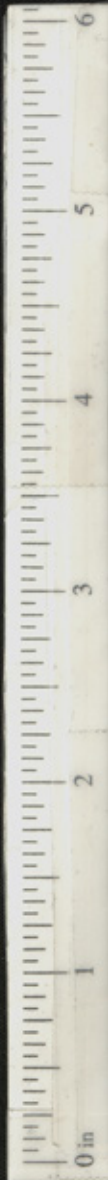

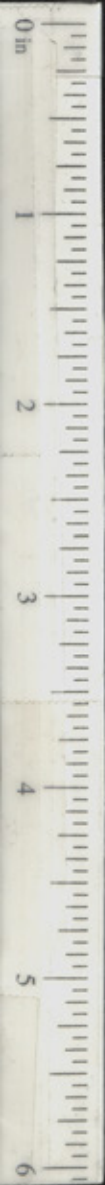

The order and discipline of a newly recruited

present, when a pile of gold coins has been  
scattered in a minute & a small rush, has  
always been peculiar to me.
