My Dear Genl. some-
time ago Gov. W. W. Laven a pension
agent from Iowa thought that I was en-
titled to some recognition by the government
in my present condition, I told him that
I had no hospital record that I had
never attended a sick call nor been
excused from duty during my four years
service in the army. True I was sick
at Pea Ridge also at Corinth Miss
at Lookout Valley Tenn and on
the Atlanta Campaign near Marietta
but not to leave the Company



if I am entitled to any recognition
at this time it must be for my pre-
sent condition physically and financially
not on account of my inability at
any time during the war to do duty
I never was wounded. I cannot furn-
ish any affidavits dating back to war
time. He had no authority from me
or otherwise to ask for affidavits dating
back to those times for the simple reason
that I was very vigorous and active
it must be for my present condition
physically and financially.

When Captured and robbed I never
was indemnified by the Gov nor for
any extra hazardous duty I ever



any recognition be made if I am
entitled to any recognition at this
time it must be for my ability
to render a good and faithful ser-
vice in time of need by the God.

if in your opinion you can do any-
thing for me at this time it will
otherwise I will brace up and try
to pull through it. will not be long
and I am willing and ready to
pass over the line; having had some
misfortunes financially I sometimes
think of possibly not being able to leave
Mrs Duncan in as good shape as I
would like to

Dear Sir,

I trust you will excuse the liberty I take in writing to you, but I am half-distracted by the pitiful and hopeless condition in which I am placed, and I cannot help it.

I am the wife of Private John H. Montague, First Artillery, a prisoner at Fort Hamilton, who told me he was going to ask you to remit his punishment and I beg to supplement his petition by also pleading for your forgiveness.

General, I am only a

young wife and am at present
in a very delicate condition.

I expect in a short-time
to become a mother, and, God
help me! I do not know what
to do when that happens for,
as I will not be able to work,
I suppose I shall lose my place.

I am utterly alone in the
world, having no near relatives,
except one little, invalid sister
whom God in his inscrutable
wisdom has stricken with
blindness and who is now utterly
dependant on me for support,
and oh! may the pleadings of
us three — the wife, the blind
sister, and the unborn babe —
reach your heart and restore
to us our natural protector.

I do not under-
stand what offence he committed

, Sir, but I am sure he did not
mean it, for he is not
naturally wicked but, on the
contrary, of a kind, and gen-
erous disposition.

General, I am on
the verge of despair, and know
not where to turn for succor,
and I appeal to you by all
you hold dearest on earth,
by your own happy home and
family, by the proverbial
kindness and gallantry of a
soldier, to pity my forlorn
and desolate state and pardon
my poor husband, thereby earning
the life-long prayers and gratitude
of.

Respectfully returned to the Assistant Adjutant General, Department of the East, Governor's Island, N. Y. City. An application for Montague's discharge from the service was made by the man himself and forwarded by his Battery Commander on March 17, 1893, recommending approval.

I forwarded the same, per endorsement dated March 18th, earnestly recommending it, in view of his sick wife and blind sister depending on him for support, also with a view, to ridding the service of this man whose numerous courts-martial attach discredit to the command. This application was returned from Headquarters, Department of the East March 22, 1893, to know whether this man intended to purchase his discharge, or whether his discharge be desired on account of worthlessness.

The endorsement by the Commanding Officer Battery "G", dated April 8, 1893, in reply thereto, stated that it was not intended by Private Montague to apply for a discharge by purchase; that there was not enough money due him for the purpose: also that he, the Battery Commander, was not satisfied in his mind that the man's record would justify

(over)

his asking for Montague's discharge on account of worthlessness, that he thought it would be in the interests of the military service and of humanity to have his case considered an exceptional one, and to have him discharged accordingly.

I re-forwarded the application, per endorsement dated April 8th, requesting attention to what had been said by me and the Commanding Officer of Battery "G" in preceding endorsements, and again recommending favorable consideration by higher authority.

It was again returned to me from Department Headquarters on April 15, 1893, to know whether this soldier married before or after enlistment, and was again returned by me on April 16th with the information that Private Montague married after enlistment.

Montague was tried on January 9th, 1893, and sentenced by General Court Martial Orders No. 4, Headquarters Department of the East January 24, 1893: To be confined at hard labor, under charge of the guard, for the period of six months, and to forfeit to the U.S. ten (10) dollars per month for the same period.

This punishment was mitigated by the Department Commander, on the solicitation of his wife and on my recommendation for special clemency, remitting all the forfeiture of pay.

He was again tried, convicted, and

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sentenced per G.C.M.O.#7, Hdqrs.
Dept. of the East, February 11th, 1893, to
to be confined at hard labor for
two months, and in addition thereto,
in lieu of any forfeiture of pay,
to serve two periods of 10 days
each, in solitary confinement, on
bread and water diet.

This punishment was mitigated
by the Department Commander to two
months' confinement, five days in
each month to be solitary on bread
and water diet; this sentence to be
executed upon expiration of the one
adjudged in G.C.M.O.#4.

He was again tried by Summary
Court March 14th, and sentenced to
forfeiture of \$10.00 of his pay, and
confinement of hard labor for one
month; and this sentence was also
mitigated by me remitting forfeiture
of pay.

I renew the recommendation I
made in the first instance-namely
that this man should be discharged.
He is a detriment to the service,
and has been the cause of more
official and private correspondence
than any ten men in my regiment.

The last sentence expires Oct. 23d.
