FIRES.—A telegram was received here Monday to the effect that eight large dry kilns filled with lumber caught fire and burned to the ground Saturday night last, entailing a loss of about \$15,000. The kilns were the property of Greenleaf Johnson & Son, at Berkley, Va. This makes a number of losses this company have sustained recently. Mr. E. W. Moody is clerking at Howard during the absence of Mr. Miller in Baltimore.

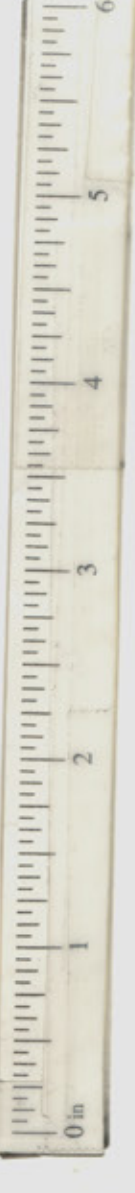
SQUIBBLES.
