If you discover any inaccuracy in the "Statement of Facts" I will be pleased to be informed and I will take pleasure in making any necessary corrections.

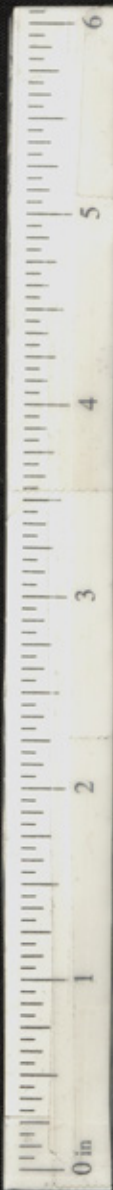

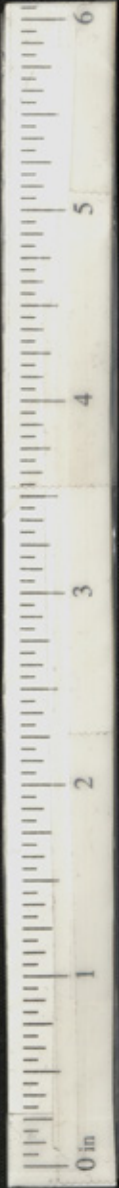
My dear Genl: Memorial Day is near

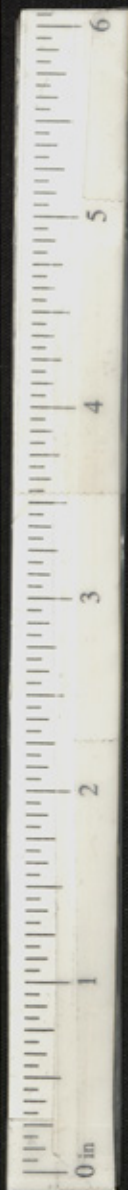
