My dear General:

I have been absent for a fortnight, and on my return I find your favor of May 10th. Anything from your pen would impress us in advance with its excellence, and you know we have tried you in the "Atlantic Monthly." I question somewhat, however, whether a subscription book on the subject you mention could be made successful through us. We publish few subscription books, and they are mostly of a character containing several volumes which we could not easily publish in any other way.
