of dollars of debt in Portland con-

I promised James a year ago that
if anything happened to him, I would

at home now at all except for a
few hours every Monday. Sunday
he spends in Astoria. So he cannot
attend to any business just now

anywhere. I shall do as well as I can
to keep things straight here. I have
a little money coming in now from a
room I rented, as I manage the little

bits. The larger ones are waiting &
growing, much to my regret. We
have credit still, at which I wonder.
But everybody is so hard up all
around that may account for it.

We may not get a chance at all to

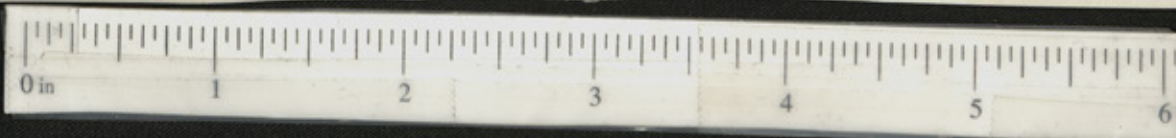

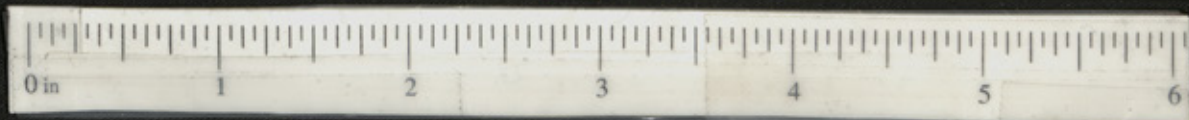
