Colonel Dudley has given me a letter of introduction to yourself, and wishes me to confer with you touching the work of the International League.

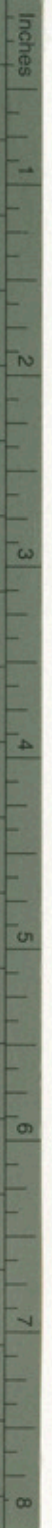
We should be glad to start a law and order organ.

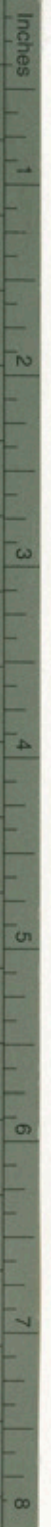

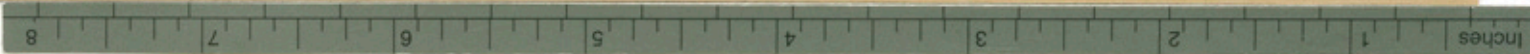

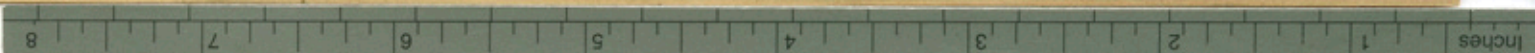
