
Dear Sir:-

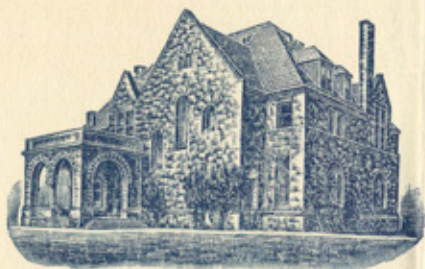
Dear General,

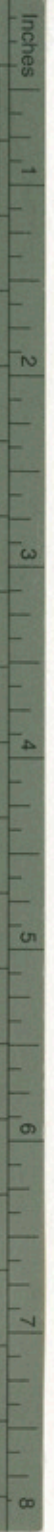

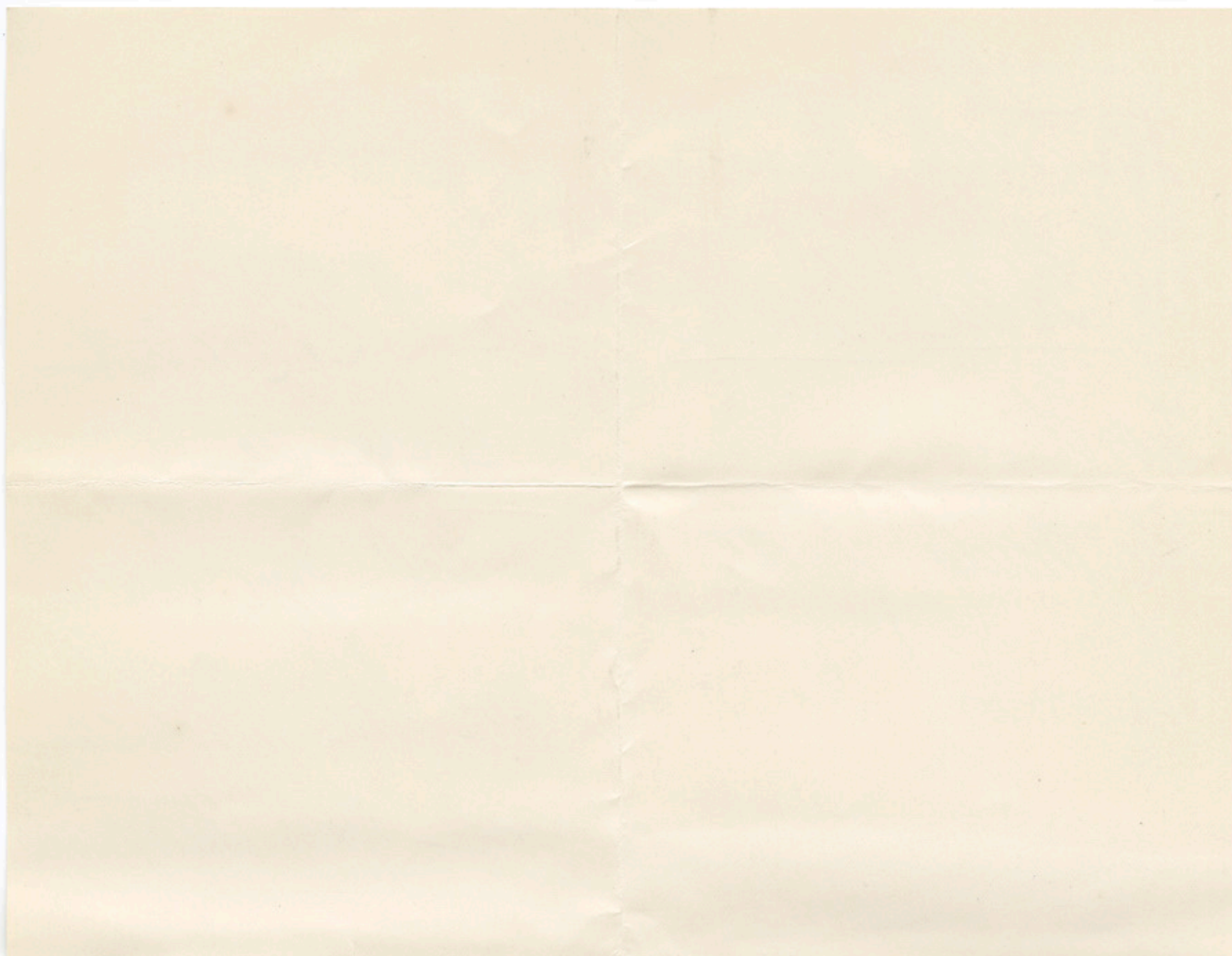
