The uncertainty of his attitude, and at the same time kr. Jno. Elilot's eritical condition, keep the latter in a constant state of excitement.

It may seem a very trivial matter to you, but the present comfort of Mr. and Mrs. Elliot depend upon learning something definite from William. Nothing but moral suasion will influence him to do anything. I wish I knew just how this could be exerted.

Dear Gen. Howard:--

I appreciate the delicacy of what I have to say but as christian brethren I beli gov ewe may both read write and read as children of the heavenly king, who desire to please Him most particularly.

The question is, what shall we call the John Jaeger enterprise? Col. Bryant suggested your name but when he suggested it although I felt that it was not just what the Lord would have yet I was not clear enough in my mind to say so to him. I have since become clear that as far as I am concerned, I do not believe the Lord would $h a v e$ me assent to this plan without a clear statement of a notherfulam.

It seems to me that it should not be named after any man and that we had better forego the obvious advantages which

Christ, you know, didn't tell the people that they shouldn't drink; He is only anxious to give them the right kind of drink.
