



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

WE, the undersigned advocates of Temperance, representing almost every method that is being urged for the overthrow of the saloon and for the spread of total abstinence, unite in a call for a National Congress of the representatives of these various methods to meet in the University Temple at Prohibition Park, Staten Island, on June 3d, 4th, and 5th. The objects of the Congress to be twofold: (1) To recognize the Providence of God in the long life and manifold labors for Temperance of General Neal Dow, who is about to celebrate his 90th birthday—Gen. Dow has accepted the invitation to be present; Joseph Cook will deliver the oration on June 3d, and Major-General O. O. Howard will preside. (2) To review fully and faithfully the entire field of battle; to compare in frank and friendly discussion the conflicting views held by the different divisions of the Temperance host; to come as nearly as possible to an agreement, so that there may be less waste of strength in disputations with one another, and that our blows against the liquor evil may be far more united and effective; to unite upon a carefully prepared Address to the People of the United States, which will aim to set forth precisely the grounds of our opposition to the saloon, and our reasons for appealing to the public to bring about at once its overthrow; to take such steps as may be necessary to place the teaching of Temperance hygiene in the Public Schools throughout the country on the basis of a fixed study—the laws making its teaching mandatory; to plan for the systematic education of the masses in Temperance statistics, facts, arguments, principles; to seek to enlist far more the pulpit and press in the advocacy of total abstinence; to place the educative power of law against the saloon; to take whatever other action against the liquor evil may be deemed wise.


We ask all local, State, and National Temperance Societies (regardless of sex, color or politics), and all churches and other religious or secular organizations which hate the saloon to send representatives to this National Congress. Each organization to be entitled to one voting delegate to each 20 members. The Congress is to be strictly a representative body.

We urge friends of Temperance everywhere to take immediate steps to see that this Congress shall be the most effective Temperance gathering that our guest, Gen. Neal Dow, has ever attended; that every section of the country, and every phase of Temperance thought be fully represented. The only condition for membership to the Congress to be this: The body sending the representative shall favor the overthrow of the saloon, and shall favor total abstinence. Friends of Temperance in Canada and in other countries will be most heartily welcomed. Each delegate will be expected to present credentials, signed by the proper officer of the society or organization that he is to represent.
