could not educate me.

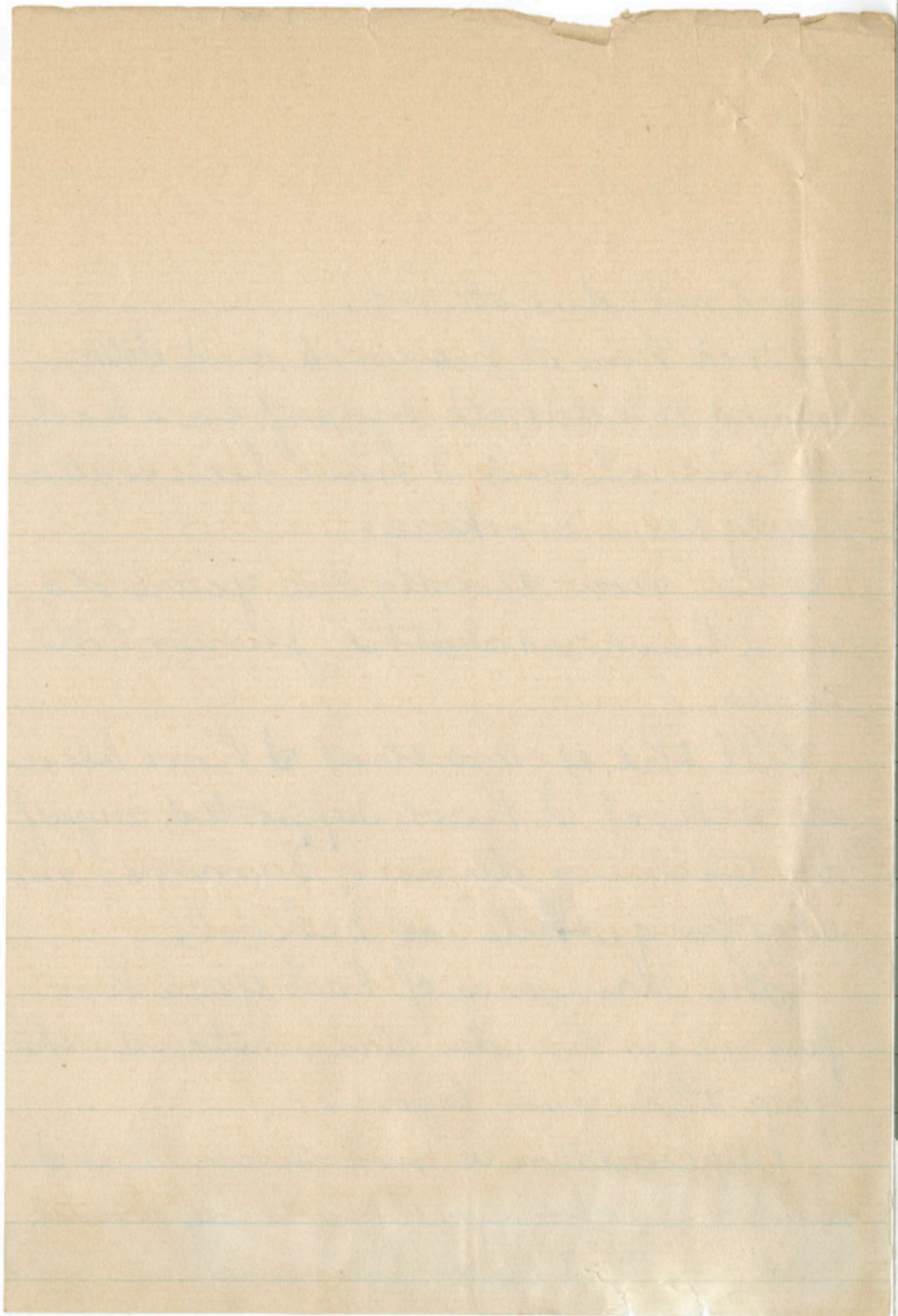
I took him at his word and determined to educate myself for a teacher, to which end I have been continually been working.

My condition is now such that I must soon have relief or leave school. But if I leave now I will not be



able to finish my course next year.

My friends who are willing to aid ^{me} are as poor as I, therefore they are unable.

I'm thinking of some one to whom I might apply for aid, the thought came to me that I would more than likely be favored by you, from the interest you showed yourself to have in my people when you were visiting us a few days ago.

It is some what strange for me to apply to a stranger for a loan, but thinking that you are familiar to my work as most northern men of your calibre are, I appeal to your sympathies in my behalf.

My object in writing is that I am sorely in need of forty five dollars to meet some bills I have made out to

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defray my expenses the rest of the year.

On what terms will you make me a loan of this amount until Summer?

Then I will return it with interest, after teaching a Summer school.

I hope you will not lightly look upon my request as I am trying to fit myself to do the work so much needed among my people.

Please let me know soon what you can do for me.


