## CONCERNING JEWS.

Dr. Robert Peck Tells of the Hebrew Race and Belief.

At the Park Street Free Baptist church last evening, Dr. Robert Peck, a converted Jew, preached. His subject was: "What about the Jews?" and in introducing him, Rev. Ernest G. Wesley took occasion to inform his hearers that he also was a Jew.

Dr. Peck chose for his text the words "Thou shalt love thy neighbor as thyself," and spoke in part as follows: "I have advocated this subject for twenty-six years and shall probably continue to do so as long as I live. There are only two of the religious systems that deserve our attention tonight, viz., Judaism and Christianity. Each of these systems has its followers. The author of the Christian religion was a Jew, and the first church was composed of Jews.

"You have heard that there were three classes of Jews existing in the world, viz., orthodox Jews, reformed Jews and infidel Jews. The orthodox Jews are, as a class, looking for the coming of the Messiah. The Old Testament contains a full account of all this and describes this class much more clearly than I am able to do.

"The reformed Jews are of the class who worship in the Friendship street synagogue. They are a little of all kinds; they are neither hot nor cold. Money is their God and it is money that they worship. The infidel Jews are much like Col. Robert Ingersoll, and are neither hot nor cold. Col. Ingersoll's trouble is, that many years ago he run for an office and was defeated. He then became a know-nothing, and from that became a chronic kicker and started out to lecture about something he knew nothing about. He does not believe what he talks, but he gets \$500 a night for talking and that is all he is looking after.

"The mind of an infidel Jew runs in the line of ethical culture, and they are neither hot nor cold.

"There are 8,000,000 Jews in the world, 800,000 of which are in North and South America. They all ought to be rich, for they trade among all classes. They are not all peddlers, as some of you think, and many of them are lawyers, doctors, ministers, merchants, bankers, etc.

"It has been said that all Jews are swindlers. This is not so. We should not judge America by the people who live in Providence, New York or Chicago, but should judge it by the whole population. And so we should not judge the Jews from a few, but from the whole.

"It is true that there are Jews who know how to drive a sharp bargain, but there are also deacons in your aristocratic churches who know how to drive sharp bargains as well. You will find but few Jews in the prison, and as a rule they are a strong and healthy people.

"They have been persecuted for 2,000 years. Christ was a Jew and he was persecuted, but he prayed that his people might be saved. They are as religious as any of us, but many of them do not believe that Christ was the Messiah.

"Brother Wesley says he is a Jew, and I think he is, for he looks like one. Can a Jew be converted? That question has been asked over and over again. Well, dear friends, the Acts of the Apostles prove that they can, our presence here tonight proves it, and your pastor proves it.

"The Jews have been neglected. You send missionaries and money all over the world, but you never go near the Jews.

"What is our duty towards the Jews? There are about 3,500 who are inquiring as to who the Messiah is. Will your churches see that they are taught? As ye sow, so shall ye reap. The time has come to work among the Jews in Providence and show that you love your neighbor as yourself."
