Dear Sir <sup>and</sup> Comrade:-

I hope you will not consider it an impertinent intrusion for an old soldier of the Sixties to write <sup>to</sup> his old time commander, as a boy private in the ranks - the bullet department - of the Fourth reg. Corps, and served with that corps from its organization until was mustered out at the close of the war in June 1865, and that too without missing an hour's duty. You doubtless witnessed our assault upon Missionary Ridge November 25<sup>th</sup> 1863. You know what the Atlanta Campaign was for us from May 7<sup>th</sup> 1864 when we climbed the slopes of Tunnel Hill and first faced Rocky Faced Ridge and Joe Johnston's army until you took command of the Army of the Tennessee July 24<sup>th</sup> or 25<sup>th</sup> in front of Atlanta - although thirty years ago it seems as but yesterday.

I was a member of Col. George F. Dick's regiment, the Eighty-sixth Indiana. It belonged to Gen. Sam Beatty's brigade of Gen. T. J. Wood's division.

We are trying to prepare a full and accurate account of of the service of our regiment for publication. Have you the
