Monterrey, Mex., May 17. 1894

(Special Correspondence) A copy of the very well-written biography of Gen. Zachary Taylor, by Major Gen. O. O. Howard, United States Army, was recently received by Prof. A. W. Fords of this city. It is published by D. Appleton & Co. of New York in "The Great Commander Series," neatly bound, gilt-edged, and contains a steel-engraved portrait of Gen. Taylor with maps of the localities where his various decisive battles were fought. The book is of especial interest to residents of Monterrey, where some of the most important events of his Mexican campaign took place. Notwithstanding the fact that half a century nearly has elapsed since their occurrence, many eye witnesses of these events are still living here. Many of the old landmarks referred to in the book are still discernible in and about the city, while others have become obliterated in the progress of time. Some three years ago, while preparing the work, Gen Howard visited Monterrey, remaining here several days to personally inspect the localities."

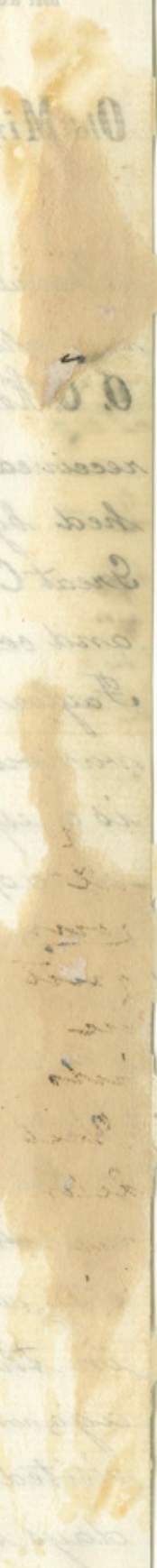

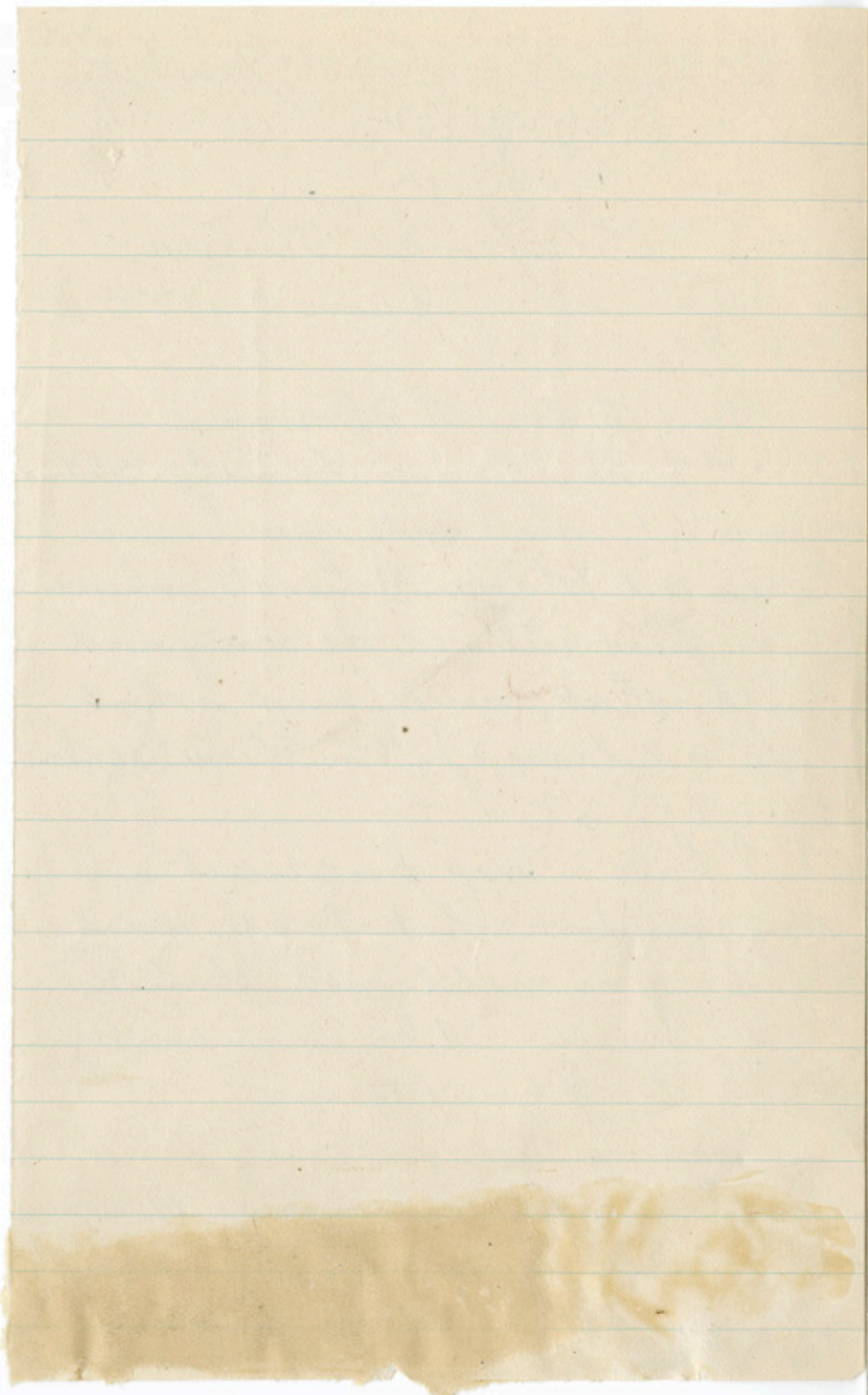
