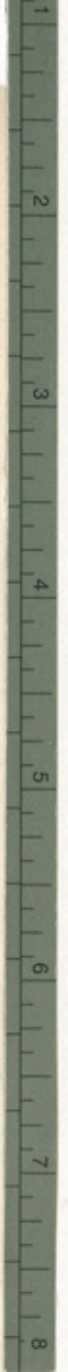

That would be so glad. To enlist if the Government would take them. Joe went in the Service without my consent. I tried to get his discharge. Two Years since but failed, on account of not being able to get witnesses to testify to his age. my husband being an General Whimster. we had left the place of his birth. when he was quite an infant. The Physician was dead. it was a small town. people we knew had either died or moved away. in our Church we keep no records of births, and so I failed.

I cannot express my regret. for his desertion. when he wrote me what he had done. had I heard of his death. it could not have hurt me worse. how full of everything. he himself was bitterly repentant. he realized what he had done. and he had a great

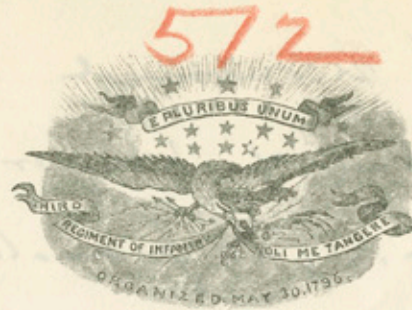
deal of respect for his Colonel there are a great many that do not like Soldiers or the Army. but I have a great deal of respect for both. My Father was a Physician and went in the Army as Surgeon at the commencement of the rebellion and at the close of the War was appointed examining Surgeon. and remained until his death three years since. my two B-sons. my only ones. went in the Army at the commencement and at the close of the War. one came home. the other lies in the Soldiers Cemetery at the St. Louis Barricks much as we all suffered in putting down the rebellion. I would give my boys to day. if my Country was in need of them. next to my God I love my Country. but now in time of peace. when there is no scarcity of men. I and others do need my boys assistance. if it

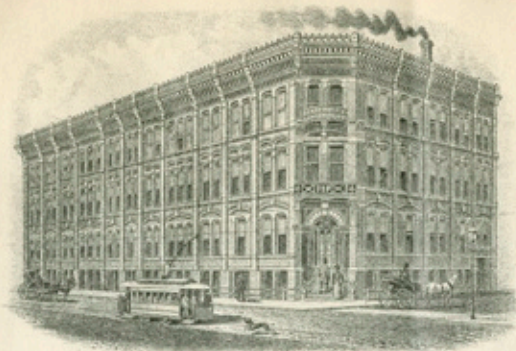
I have

served in Western Texas after the  
War, and afterwards under you in  
the Dept of the Columbia. I have  
been in the Service over 30 yrs.  
during which time I have had  
about 6 months leave of absence in  
all. At all times I have tried  
loyalty to do my duty. I retired  
from active Service May 31 1895,

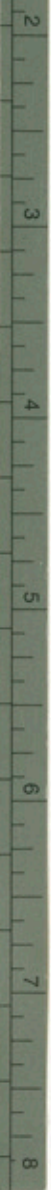

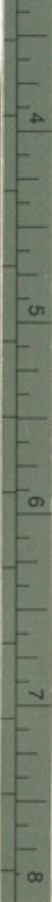
