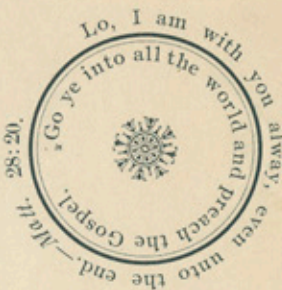

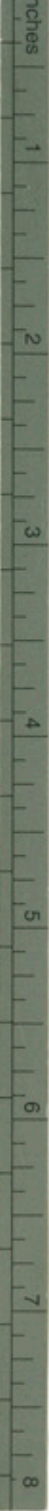
Dear Sir;
