Dear General:-

The work of endeavoring to extend the cause of our Congregational Christianity, if I may so express it, is so manysided and varied that one cannot keep in contact with as many parts of it as one might wish.

The Extension Society, in the starting of which your countenance and aid were so valuable, is step by step accomplishing some good things. Step number one was the aiding in the time of its great need of the North New York Church, with a loan, on second mortgage, of \$2000 Step number two was the helping the young Mount Vernon Church with a gift of \$1000. Step number three is the bringing such influence to bear upon the Congregational Church Building Society as to persuade it to make a pledge of \$3000 to the Church on Bushwick Avenue, Brooklyn, on condition that the Extension Society raise a similar amount, thus securing \$10000, with which to take up a gift, made by one now dead, of no loss than \$30,000.

The Extension Society, at its last meeting, pledged itself to raise their \$5000; and it is of interest to remark how this pledge was made. Several gentlemen, in fact all present at the directors' meeting, divided the amount among themselves and promised to do their best to obtain the money. There was a time when they would not have done so.

Thus, General, these brethren, unconsciously perhaps, but none the less truly, have undertaken to do what you have been doing for many years, and in recent years, for the Camp Chapel. You have set them the example. And I believe we shall see more of this in the future. Here is one of the things I have been longing to see in the interest of new work in these parts.

I am sorry that you have not been able to attend the meetings recently, but I know that you will be pleased to read what I have said. The example which you have set has borne fruit. For example, Dr. Lyman, of the South Church, has in less than a week raised, personally, his quota. Dr. Stimson is an invaluable addition to the Board.

In regard to Camp Chapel, I am glad that Mr. Slyfield has so soon, thanks to your kind references, found another field of labor. He came to me for advice as to what to do, and I urged him to come to you and assured him that you would do more for him than he might imagine. Those endorsements, so numerous, and scatterd so widely, which you gave him, prove the correctness of my opinion. I told the brother that such recommendations from yourself would prove of more value to him than all others put together.

Mr. Slyfield has done excellent work at the Chapel. For my part,

The conditions in that unique field are such that no man, I fear, is likely to stay long. There is not another field in this department, aided by the Home Missionary Society, where a proposal to employ for a few months a man who had been a Congregational Seminary stuffent, and who was indebted to the denomination for his education, would have been rejected, as was the case in Camp Chapel, with that German brother whom you wished to put there, for a while, to help the pastor.

Camp Church is unique. It is the outpost of the Congregational Churches in Darkest New York. It is point of vantage. Occasional services should be held there aimed at the foreign nationalities which swarm there. An occasional service for the Jews. An attempt to reach the Italians. I have in mind now an educated and converted Protestant Italian, of whom I have been told - M. Gasparini - who can speak well and convincingly to his countrymen. Camp Church is the place for such attempts. They would in no way hurt the work, the regular work, now in progress there.

Is it to be supposed that any such propositions would be received with favor? Not, if past experience is a guide. Dr. Virgin opens his church to the Spanish, and to the missionary of the H. M. S., Rev. Mr. Lopez. Would Camp Church brethren?

The Colonel from Mount Vernon may have been extreme in some of his positions, but there was much truth in his idea as to the special character of the work in Chrystie Street. He was narrow in that he was so much wrapped up in Yager.

I look with some anxiety at the future of the work when your hand shall in a measure be taken off of it. The brethren were expressing the opinion that \$300. per annum was as large a salary as ought to be paid, when I last spoke with them as to Mr. Slyfield's successor. It seems to me that it will be difficult to secure a competent man for so small a sum.

Possibly you have some one in mind? The improvements which you are making are to be a help, indeed, but I wish that things were in such shape there that <u>all</u> the good the plant is capable of carrying might be accomplished. One cannot have, in that locality, a family, select church, even if the people there had the money themselves to sus; tain it. An uptown church in a downtown neighborhood is a contradiction.

I will take the liberty of calling tomorrow, that is, Saturday morning, before 12 o'clock, with the hope of seeing you.
