

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

My dear General:

I beg respectfully to acknowledge receipt yours Jan 21. Am glad you have become a resident of our city.

Now, in regard to the veteran, Henry Von Hess, Esq., in whose interest you write, I beg to say I have never in my whole career here had as much difficulty in getting down to the real facts of a case as I have in regard to this , and even yet the case is involved in some mystery.

The record shows that Henry Von Hess was October 5,1862, enrolled as a private in Company "M", 14th Illinois Infancry; Jan 7, 1863 mustered in; March 10, 1863, reported deserted; August 3,1863, reported in Hospital Camp Nelson, Ky; November 1, 1863 restored to duty; December 31, 1863, sick at Cumberland cap; April 3, 1864 in hospital Camp Nelson; August 31, 1864, sent to hospital at Camp Nelson; muster out roll same as above. Medical records show treatment to April 26,1864; April 30, 1864, reported sick in hospital at Camp Nelson, Ky; June 30, 1864 absent; August 31, 1864, sent to hospital at Camp Nelson. The medical records show that he was treated in Nelson General Hospital, Camp Nelson, Ky., from Jan 2 to March , 1864 for gun-shot wound of leg, and returned to duty

He did not rejoin his regiment and no record of discharge has been found. On Mr Von Hess being called upon to explain why he did not join his regiment, he unfortunately has made different and contradictory statements under oath.

In his application for removal of charge of desertion dated December 6, A. D., 1892, and sworn to at Portland, Oregon, he makes the following statement:

"Was enlisted as a private in Company "M" in the 14th regiment Illinois Cavalry Volunteers about the 5th day of October 1862 at Chicago, State of Illinois; mustered into the service 10th day of January 1863 at Peoria; served faithfully until on or about the day of February, 1864, when without any intention of deserting, left the regiment under the following circumstances: After being mustered in we left for Kentucky and after an engagement at Turkey Neck, went into Tennessee. I was in the battle at Buffington, when Morgan was captured. In the commencement of September I was at Knoxville and Cumb erland Gap in several fights, when returning from Virginia to Knoxville my head and leg was fractured

by the explosion of a shell throwing the fragments of a large tree

against me, knocking me down. Surgeon George Wilson bandaged the same and brought us to Cumberland cap and I was placed in a log cabin where I laid on the naked floor with others until about

February 1864. From here Colonel Thielman of the 16th Illinois Cavalry transferred me to Camp Nelson, and while en route broke my leg again and staid with a farmer by the name of Wehsle until I was able to proceed, and when I arrived at Camp Nelson my leg was reset by the attending surgeon and staid here in my own tent (and was attended too by a lady who afterward became my wife) and laid here over a year about August 1865. When I was about to leave Camp Nelson I learned that my regiment had been mustered out and still sufferi

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still suffering from the effects of a fractured skull (the scars still remain) I went to Kansas City where I lived ten years. "

According, therefore, General, to this affidavit, Mr Von Hess gave as a reason for not joining his regiment when discharged at comp Nelson that he understood the regiment was mustered out and that he then did not enter the service again but went to Kansas City where he remained ten years, his last service according to this affidavot being about February 1864. Prior to this, however, in support of an application for an honorable discharge, Von Hess testified, February 1,1892, that he was wounded at Bean's Station, Tenn., about December 10--14, 1863, by a shell striking and throwing a heavy limb of a tree against his left leg below the knee; that he was sent to different places and finally to general hospital at Cumberland gap, Tennessee; that in at empting to return to Camp Nelson, Ky., to find his regiment, his horse fell and his leg was again broken, but he finally reached Camp Nelson and remained there until about August or September, 1865, when he was sent home without a discharge; that while at Camp Nelson, Ky., he was, he states, in an old log house, but was all the time under treatment by the surgeon at the camp; that as soon as he was able to stand the fatigue of travel he started hometo Cincinnati, Ohio, where he remained about six weeks, and then went to his former home in Germany, hoping that he might have the benefit of treatment there and that he returned to the United States in the summer of 1872."

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Thus you will see, my dear General, that on February 1, 1892, Von Hess swears that he went to Germany about September 1865 and remained there until 1872, while in the other affidavit above quoted, he swears he went to Kansas City about the sametime -- September, 1865-and remained there ten years. But it turns out that neither of these affidavits is correct, as the record in the Department shows that Henry Von Hess enlisted August 13,1864 and was assigned to Company "G", 41st Missouri Infantry. The record also shows that he served faithfully until August 11,1865, when he was mustered out with his Company at Benton Barracks, Mo., as a private. The record further shows that he was not transferred to the Missouri Regiment from Company "M", 14th Ill. Cavalry, but that his service therein was under an entirely different enlistment. This latter enlistment in the Missouri Regiment was it is held by the Department in violation of the 22d (now 50th) article of war, and as he received a gratuity, to which he would not have been entitled had he remained with his original command, his case is not covered by the act of Congress, approved March 2,1889.

The theory of the Department is simply this: That Von Hess, on being discharged from the hospital, instead of joining his old regiment, enlisted in a new company and regiment for the purpose of obtaining a bounty, and as you will see, my dear General, when called to account as to why he did not join his regiment

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
he in one statement claimed that he was transferred to the other regiment and after serving his time faithfully and being discharged he went to Germany and remained there seven years, while in another account he makes no claim that he was transferred to or join any other regiment, but that hearing his regiment was mustered out he went to Kansas City and remained ten years.

I have thus, my dear General, gone into this case fully and I will be obliged if you will kindly confer with Mr Von Hess and allow him to see this letter, and if he wishes to make any further explanation, I shall be glad to bring it to the attention of the Committee on Military Affairs and the War Department. I have had a bill pending (copy inclosed) for his relief for sometime, but as the matter stands, you will readily see how impossible it is to obtain the relief prayed for.
