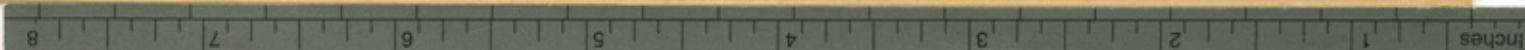

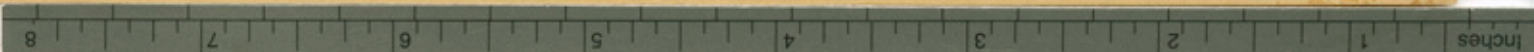

Dear General:-

I send you by this day's mail a copy of the Secretary's report for 1877 which contains the report of your campaign against the Nez Perces, to refresh your memory. On page 658 of that volume it is stated that Captain Trimble "is mentioned for gallantry in action at the battle of the Clear-water," etc., but we have been unable to find any mention of him in the reports of any of your subordinate officers for that action, and consequently could not find the details of the particular act or acts of gallantry which the law requires as a basis for a brevet. A note from you to Captain Trimble, whose address is No. 2027 Francisco Street, Berkeley, California, would no doubt elicit the necessary details.

Captain Wells's service at Camas were under your own eye, and with the aid of your report you would perhaps be able to give some specific recital.

As regards Lieut. Forse, since his name is not among those of the officers commended by you at the time we have been unable to find any details of his action at the Clear-water. He served in Captain Winter's troop, E, and is now at
