

A letter just received from the Military-Naval Publishing Co., contains this <sup>Statement</sup> notice: "We learn through Gen. O. O. Howard that the military definitions of the 'Standard Dictionary' were made from 'Farrow's Encyclopedia'. There surely must be some mistake about this, we are at a loss to know how you could have made this statement, as the definitions were originally made up by our dictionary office editors, and then revised by yourself where you found them wrong. Our editors used a score or more of the different military authorities in <sup>Military</sup> making out the definitions, and many letters were sent to the different military authorities for special information. By comparing the definitions in "Farrow" with those in the "Standard Dictionary", we find very little sameness in them. In fact they are as different one from the other, as is usually the case with definitions of the same words in different dictionaries. As you readily see it will be hurtful to have statements of this kind made.






