

Yours of the 24th.is at hand. I did not get a chance to answer it in time to mail to Glencoe, and therefore have not hurried to reply. I fear there is a little misapprehension perhaps on my part in regard to the compensation for your article. I would not for anything seem to haggle on a matter of this kind. What you wrote in your first letter, in which you promised to write the introductory matter, stated that your price would be \$15.00 per thousand words, and that you expected then to contribute about 2000 words. Mr.Odell is financially interested with us in the getting out of the book and we have already written him stating the price that you named. We have naturally figured on this basis in counting the cost of the first issue. The matter you sent us amounts to about 1200 words. Would it not be satisfactory if we would send you under the circumstances \$25.00? I am sorry if we have labored under any misapprehension, and would not want to seem small in the matter, but you will see just the position I am placed in.
