The dues of this Post are \$6 per annum,
payable quarterly *in advance*.

Chap. V. Article IV, Section 4, R. & R., reads as follows:

Any member of a Post who is six months in arrears in the payment of his dues shall be notified thereof in writing by the Post Quartermaster, and if the same are not paid within two months thereafter he may be suspended from all privileges of membership by vote of the Post, and be then so reported in the Quarterly Reports to Department Headquarters, until such dues are paid. Provided, however, that when a Comrade is unable by reason of sickness or misfortune to pay his dues, they may be remitted by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at a regular meeting of the Post.

And Section 4 of same article Says:

If a member of a Post shall be one year in arrears for dues he shall be notified thereof in writing by the Post Quartermaster, and on failure for two months thereafter to pay such dues he may by vote of the Post be dropped from the Roll, unless relieved from such payment; and can be re-instated only by the Post which dropped him by a two-thirds vote by ballot of all the members present and voting at a regular meeting upon payment of a sum to be prescribed by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting at a regular meeting, said sum not to be less than the amount charged as muster in fee.







Some years ago when you were located at Omaha you were interested in Franklin Academy, through Rev. C. S. Harrison, Inspector of the Congl church here. I trust you may retain some remembrance of the Academy, and ful interest, as I know you do, in the cause of Christian education. The enclosed card will explain the straits we are in.

The Congregational Education ^{Society} ~~voted~~ to aid us this year to the amount of \$1500, but conditioned their grant on our raising enough to pay all
