So we are doing practical temperance work, at a very small weekly cost - (\$1.20).

Our work is keeping up to the full interest - Sunday & week day services well attended - The last boys meeting filled the basement - The outlook is very bright. If we go ahead with the work as the Lord opens the way, we shall have one of the most effective missions in New York. I am praying that the Lord may raise up Patrons who will give and utilize this wonderful

blessed them. I have no doubt that in
the fall all our meetings will be crowded
and many souls saved.

The Am. Mect. Soc. has granted Bro.
Jaeger a Commission & pays him \$25⁰⁰ per
month. Bro. John is pleased that we work
hand in hand for the salvation of those whom
we find on this highway between Jerusalem
& Jericho.
