Dear Sir:-

Replying to your favor of Oct. 31st I have to say that the dividends from our Safety Fund are not declared quarterly but semi-annually, rather, in the months of January and July, and the credits from this source appear therefore upon the notices of the March and September Calls. This will explain to you why there was no dividend shown on the notice of the Call maturing Dec. 1st upon Gen. O. O. Howard's Policies Nos. 14816-20 and 54368.

As regards the cost of this insurance, I have to say that after the table ratio for age 65 is attained by our method of advancing the rates at the close of each policy year, no further advancement is made, and the cost varies thereafter from year to year only with the fluctuation in our death rate, which we have reason to believe will be comparatively slight. Gen. Howard's oldest Policies with us were issued in December 1880 at age 50, hence you will see that the table ratio for age 65 has not been reached with him, but after December of the present year the advancement with the ratio for age 65 will be made and subsequent Calls will vary, as you will now understand, only with the variation in our mortality experience. I am glad to have had the opportunity of explaining this to you.



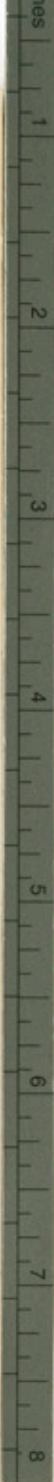
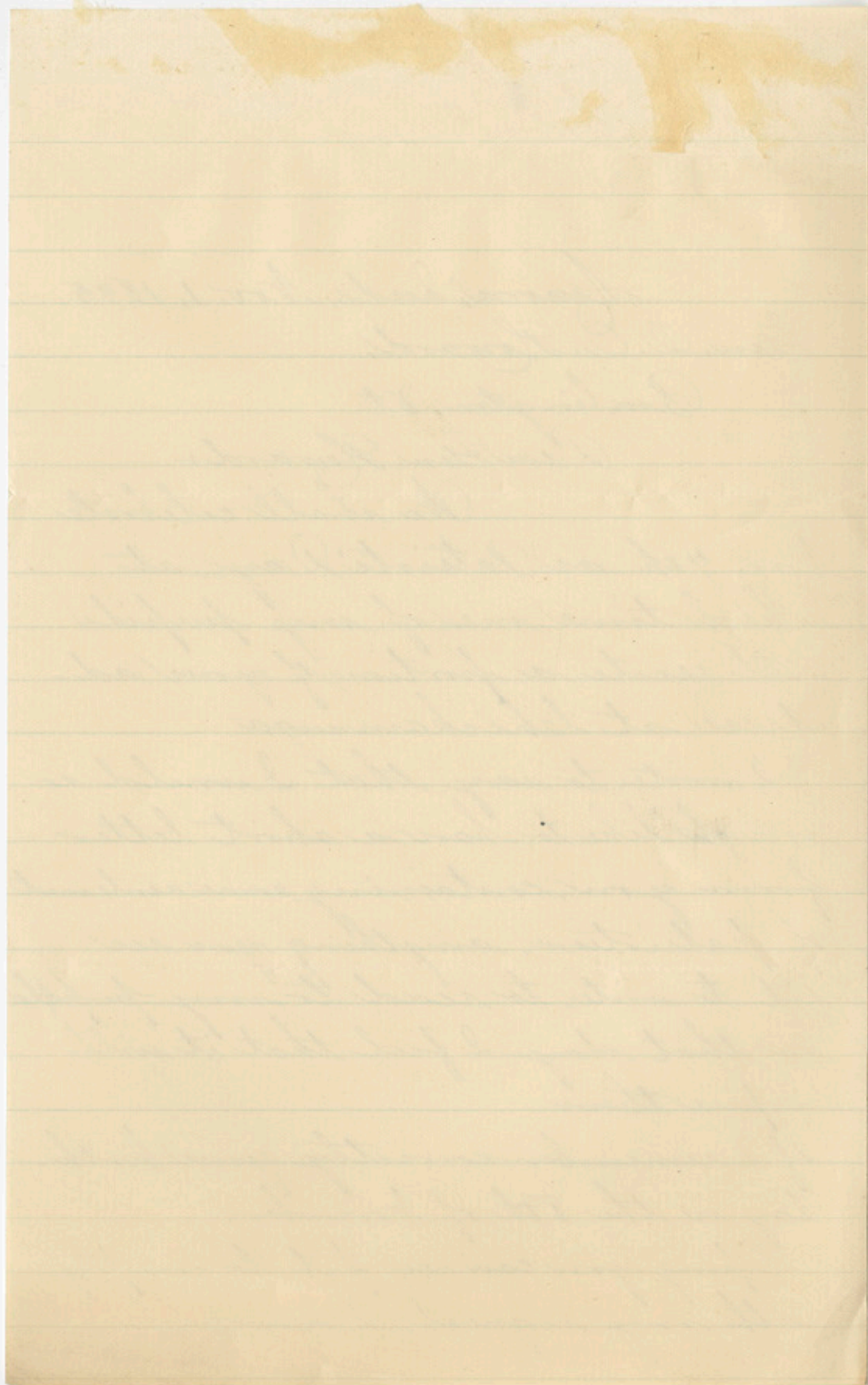
Dear Gen. Howard:

dress at Chickamauga.

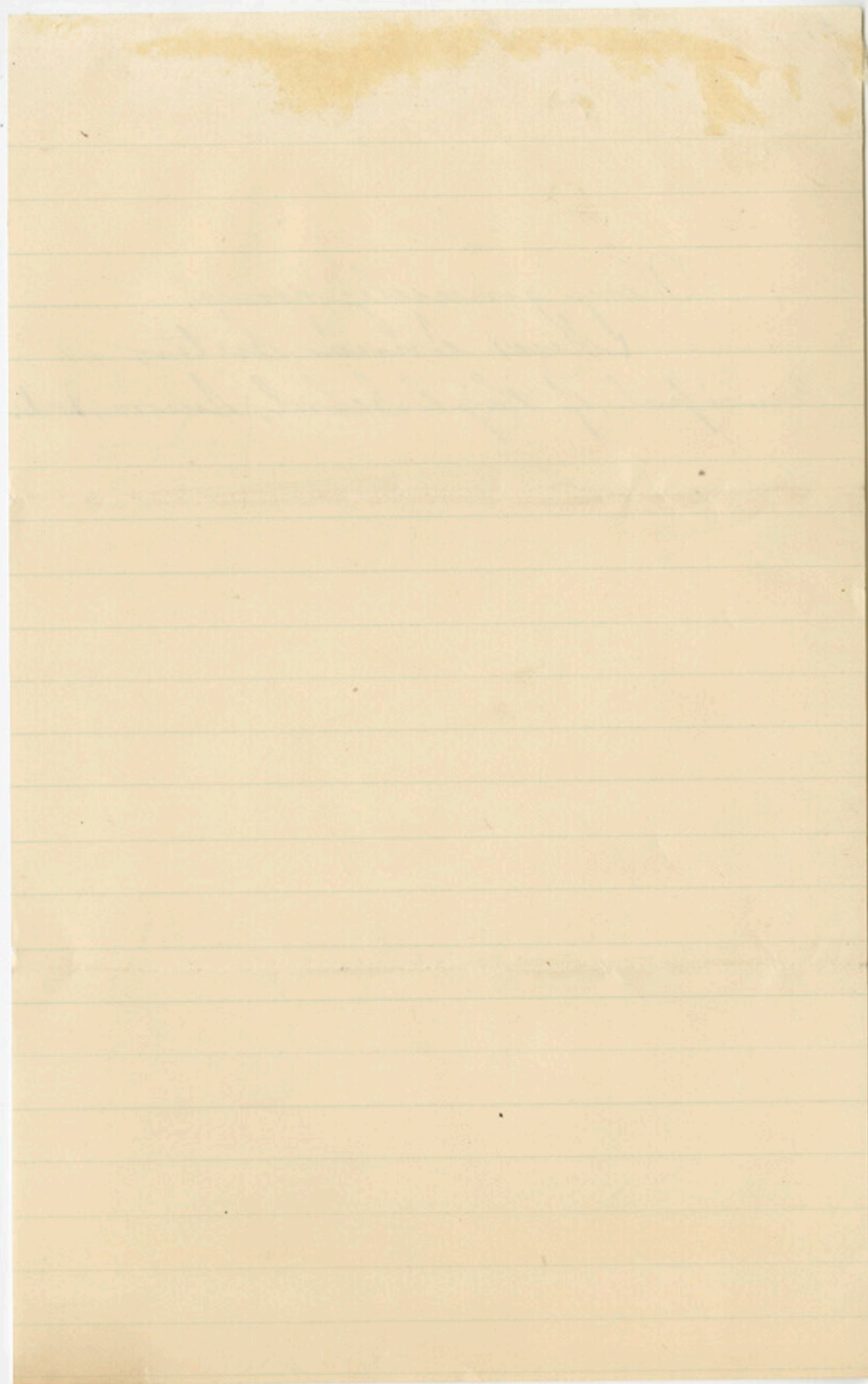
I write to say that I would so

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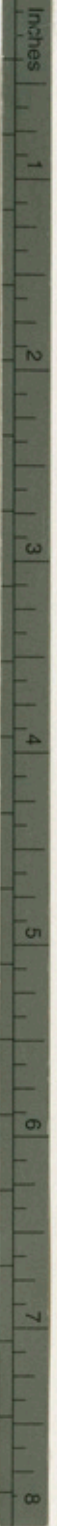

appreciated, my wife & daughter



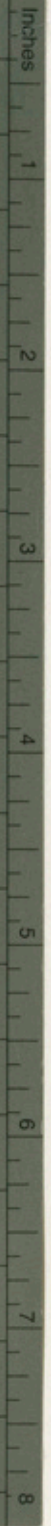

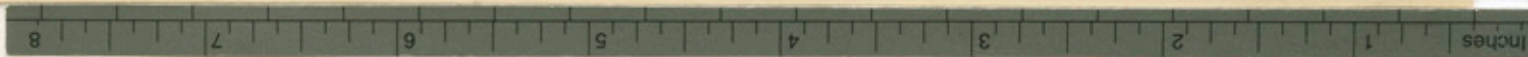

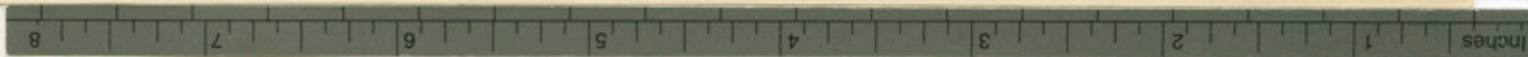
It has occurred to me

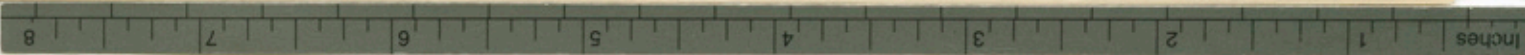

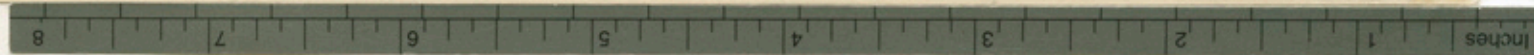


