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CUSTER'S LAST FIGHT.

It was not until several days after the memorable 28th of June, 1876, that the Associated Press Despatches conveyed to the American people the sad tidings of the massacre of that gallant cavalry general, George A. Custer, and the troops under his immediate command, His encounter with a large horde of savages was not governed by the military tactics of modern warfare, but the annihilation of himself and little band was attended by all that craft and brutality which characterized the savages who then inhabited the wilds of Western America. It was a hand to hand fight, and resulted in the extermination of the assailed. Surrounded on all sides by thousands of bloodthirsty savages, this valiant little band of 265 troops and their officers fell, man after man, until not one remained to tell the story of the affray. Two days afterwards, on the 27th of June, Alfred H. Terry, the General in command, arrived with his troops upon the sad and desolate scene of the struggle, but there remained nothing for him. but to bury the dead and inform the world of the sad catastrophe. Contemporaneous reports of the battle acquainted the people, as far as possible, with the facts and circumstances of the occurence, but it remained for the present generation, who can judge dispassionately between the contending parties, to describe and illustrate graphically the details of that terrible struggle. The scene of the battle has been visited by the artist, and the details of the engagement have been explained to him by those who are most familiar with the scene, so that, in the tactic details of the battle, it more clearly conforms to the historical facts, than all other preceding publications and illustrations of a kindred nature. The fact alone, that the living likeness of the most noted participants in Custer's Last Battle, have been taken from family photographs and worked into the scene, assures the work to be of a permanently historical nature.

The original sketch was produced by Cassily Adams, and it is pre-eminently the best painting of the last moments of the conflict. His production has been purchased by the Anheuser-Busch Brewing Association, and at the request of its President, Mr. Adolphus Busch, it was presented by the late Mr. C.E. Soest on the June, 1895, in the name of our corporation, to the Seventh Regiment U.S. Cavalry, stationed at that time at Fort Riley, Kansas. Your favor of the 1st inst. came duly to hand and contents are carefully noted. In reply I would state that you labor under a mistake, if you think seriously that 5140 acres mortgaged land, which forms the basis security for the note endorsed by General Howard and myself, if sold by strangers would in these times cover more than note, under the most favorable circumstances, although the land is well worth \$2-3 per acre, even now, in friendly hands. The danger lies in the fact that three years' tax bills are, according to an act of the legislature of Fla. give final possession, although the Supreme Court has not decided upon this question; but Gen. Swayne told me sometime ago he thought the law would hold. The Company has about 10000 acres more situated in the same way and the F. C. P. R. R. 
