The men who answered the call of Abraham Lincoln to put down rebellion and save the Union, have lost none of their love for the Country and their devotion to the flag they fought to uphold, and see in present efforts of demagogues to tarnish the good name of the Republic and break down its most cherished institutions.

The Stars and Stripes symbolize, to those who offered their lives in its defence, a country united and powerful, respected at home, honored the world over for its power, its justice, and still more for its integrity, honesty and its fair dealing.

Comrades, you believe in liberty under law; in public order; in national honor and good faith. You are opposed to the red flag of anarchy, you condemn mob rule and all movements to overturn law and order. We believe that you resent with earnestness all attacks upon the executive and judicial departments of our government and commend all measures which vindicate the supremacy of the law and restore public order whenever endangered.

Should this dangerous and revolutionary conspiracy succeed, every pensioner, every depositor in a savings bank; every policy holder in an insurance company, cooperative banks and building and loan associations and assessment insurance society will lose one-half of what is due him by being paid in fifty cent silver dollars. The price of everything the working man buys will be doubled at once; but he will have to struggle and wait long before he secures any substantial increase of his wages.

We ask you to unite without reference to your past party affiliations. Come together in non-partisan associations as you did in those other days.

The sons of the fathers who followed the flag from 1861 to 1865, should defend the blessings secured to them by the services, the sufferings and the valor of their sires. Therefore we invite all sons of Veteran sires to unite with us in this campaign against National honor and disgrace.

My dear General Howard:

Returning from an absence of some days, I have yours of yesterday. If I seemed to you serious, it was not more so than I felt. At the same time, nothing was further from my mind than to sit in judgment upon you, or wallver in grateful affection and regard. What troubled me was, that your own brother and your valued friends deemed that of much importance to you which I could easily do, if I could bring my judgment to regard it otherwise than both derogatory and injurious to you. Your taking and holding the place, - if it came in such a way that you could with dignity accept it - seems to me in every way proper and desirable: but that you with your deserved honors and distinguished reputation, should be rushed into Mr. McKinley's presence with the very first froth and soum of the great and greedy office-seeking wave of those who cannot wait until it is found if there are offices to give, and to be pressed upon him for a confidential place - as to which it would seem the least delicacy would allow him some Cattitude of personal selection, was a treatment of you at which my respectful affection could not but revolt. I could not see it otherwise, and yet, as I have said, it was your own brother and your valued friends who urged upon me that I should, and that did make it serious, and make me write to him that I would not do it. otherwise than expressly at your wish. I have from him since I saw you - a third letter upon the subject.

Meantime, I have talked with General Dodge, who spontaneously expressed himself just as I felt about the injury your being put in such an attitude would do you.

I need hardly say I shall be heartily glad if McKinly is elected, and you are made Secretary of War; but so far as I am concerned, I can only say to your brother, that such letters at this time must be written - if at all - by someone else than myself. Meanwhile, I am heartily glad you are going into Maine; your doing so in a dis-interested way seems to me to be more effective than office-seeking letters.

If your offer of services so readily accepted, had been coupled through my hand with a left-handed demand for compensation
