I do not wish to becmeme a bother to you, but I have met with a very great loss one which I cannot replace without your assistance, that is the first letter you wrote me upon the receipt of Captain Jeffords, letter of introduction, it contained a statement which is invaluable to me, as a refferance namely. "That Captain Jeffords was the only man who could take me or any one else through the Apache country and into Kid's band and bring me out alive also you spoke very highly of the Captains varasity, and that the government owed much to the brave old man for the advise he gave the Indians &c." Now General I cannot tell when or how that letter vanished, and will you please write me one more to take its place, and above allaplease send with it a Photograph of youself, I will appreciate that favor I cannot tell you how much I am still working hard preparing my book on the "Apache's Their Traditions and Folk Lore" I am about to be made a member of the "Beographical Club of Philadelphia" I recieved my first papers of requirements yesterday, I am expecting to go to Captain Jeffords home in the Owl Head mountains in Arizona, about the first of the month, to finish getting some particular data which only he can give concearning my work. The poor fellow was robbed a few weeks ago by bandit's of every bit of his clotheing food mule infact every thing he had, I recieved a letter from a gentleman and a high Mason who is our friend stateing these facts and he said he had given the poor man eight dollars to get grub and some others had given him some clotheing, but I do wish I could help him, more he is so good kind and generous to every body himself when he has anything to give now he is old and afflicted and out of money and no way of making any, and proud will not ask for help, my heart aches, I must suceed that I may be able to do more good for the deserving poor. Your good letters to me where you speak so kindly of him will be a bright spot in his pitteful life and if you can please write me as strong a letter in praise of him and send the photo that I may take them with me to show him and make him happy in thought of his dear friend whom he calls you.

General I am realy soory to bother you, but I believe you are a kind man and will understand me in this matter. Captain wished me to ask you when you thought you would be able to visit California again, he often asks after you when he writes me and my husband.
