Dear General Howard:-

In writing to ask a renewal of your contribution of \$25 to the work of the International Committee for 1896, I would say that the past year has been one of unprecedented success in every department except finances. We are coming towards the close of the year many thousand dollars in debt, and yet we hope by the help of friends, now that there is a revival of business, to close the year free of debt, as we have done every year for thirty years.

Our College Department has done a good work. Over 1100 students were in attendance at our four Summer Schools - 500 at Northfield under the influence of Mr. Moody for ten days. 3400 students were converted last year - 600 more than in any previous year. Over 10,000 students are now studying the Bible in Association Bible classes, and the Bible is used as a text book in many colleges as the result of our Association work.

In our Railroad Department it was our best year. For the first time we have gotten hold of the Grand Trunk lines in Canada and in New England, and are making wonderful progress in the South and West. Many hundreds of railroad men have been converted in connection with this work - more than in any previous year. The Educational Department has made marked progress, and over 26,000 young men are in Association classes.

Our most remarkable work, and one in which the hand of God has been most evident, has been for students in other lands. We have organized a Federation of students of all lands under the direction of Mr. Mott, our College Secretary. He has recently held a series of six conferences for students in India and Ceylon. They were attended by over 1000 students from 133 colleges, and by nearly 500 missionaries and native Christian workers. In these conferences 87 native students professed conversion, 137 dedicated their lives to Christian work, and over 500 covenanted to give the first half hour of each day to prayer and Bible study.

As a busy man I do not wish to burden you with documents but I would like you to read the letter that I enclose from Mr. Mott in relation to his work for students in Australia. It is even more remarkable than the one in India. After reading it will you kindly return it that I may send it to others.

Of course I have not forgotten that last year, being the first from official duty, you reduced the amount of your annual contribution from \$25 to \$15, but I hope this year you may be disposed to resume the contribution that you have been accustomed to give us. The family in Chambersburg were delighted with your visit and are hoping that some day they may have the pleasure of seeing you again. They have always

I was much interested in the tour of the generals through the West, and if the land-slide had not been so complete, we should have attributed a good deal of the result to the campaign made by yourself and the other veterans.
