

Your letter of the 27th inst. enclosing a letter to Col. Huntington W. Jackson has been received. I called on Mr. Hunt Jackson this morning and presented your letter. As he has just returned from an absence of a week and considerable business has accumulated, he made an appointment with me for Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock. I am glad that you thought of him, because he is so well acquainted in Chicago and I think he has enthusiasm.

This morning I received a letter from Mr. Myers. He and Mrs. Myers are still at Clifton Springs, N. Y. From the letter I judge that he is in great distress on account of his wife's sickness. He is apparently entirely unfitted for business. I hardly think that we can count on him for much assistance in getting the \$5500 needed for the payment on the Four Seasons property December 27th. Do you now know of some one from whom we can borrow this amount? The security ought to be ample. The Four Seasons property is itself worth a great deal more than the total purchase price. Furthermore, we have additional property there which can be given as security. I look upon the making of this payment as an emergency and an essential to the whole work. When this has

been done, we shall have 2 1/2 years to hold on, and I am ready to work every day to put the matter through.
