Replying to your favor of the 15th inst. We have this day received two letters, one from the California Investment & Colonization Co., and one from their agent at Bakersfield. We judge from the way they write that these people are depending on sales of land and collections thereform hence, we doubt if they will be able to pay in full next month, as promised.

The Bakersfield agent writes that he has paid the mortgage taxes, amounting in all to about \$250. We have written for the tax bills, and hope to get them by promising to credit the

amount on account.

Land is taxed in the State on the Assessor's valuation. Mortgages must be assessed at their face value, and the mortgagee must pay the mortgage tax on the full amount of the mortgage. The land-owner must pay taxes on the balance, if any there be, over and above the mortgage and the Assessor's valuation of the land.

Under present conditions we would not advise you to foreclose, for the reason that you might have to take back land that could not be sold for the amount due you for some time to come. The cost of foreclosure would be about \$250., which the mortgagor would have to pay in case the suit was decided in your favor.




