



Boyer served on your staff throughout the Gettysburg Campaign, "participating in all the engagements and returning with the Army of the Potomac to Virginia and whether from Warrenton Junction" as stated he "was ordered through you" to take Command of all troops along the line of Railroads leading from Alexandria to the Army of the Potomac?"


