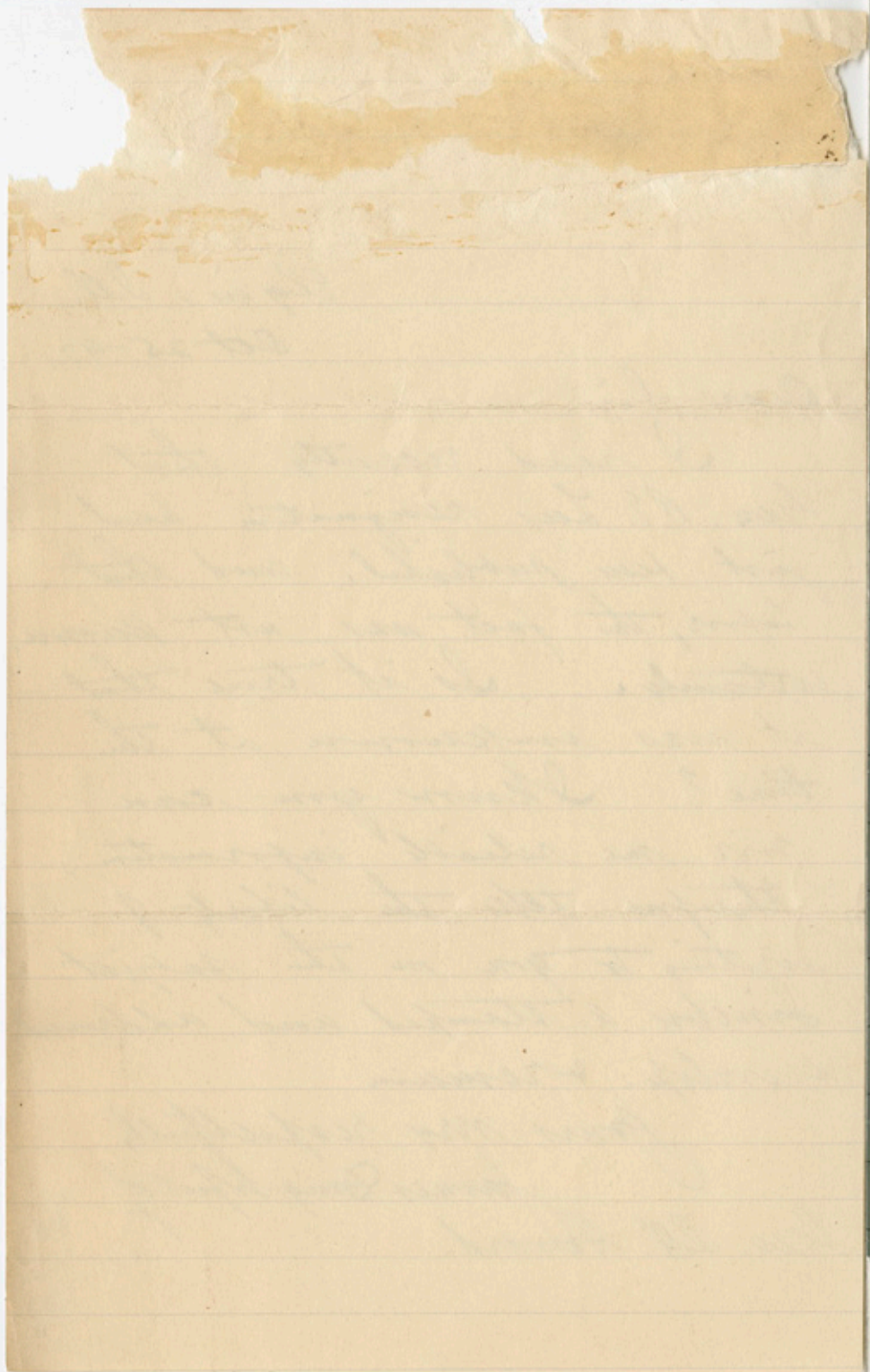

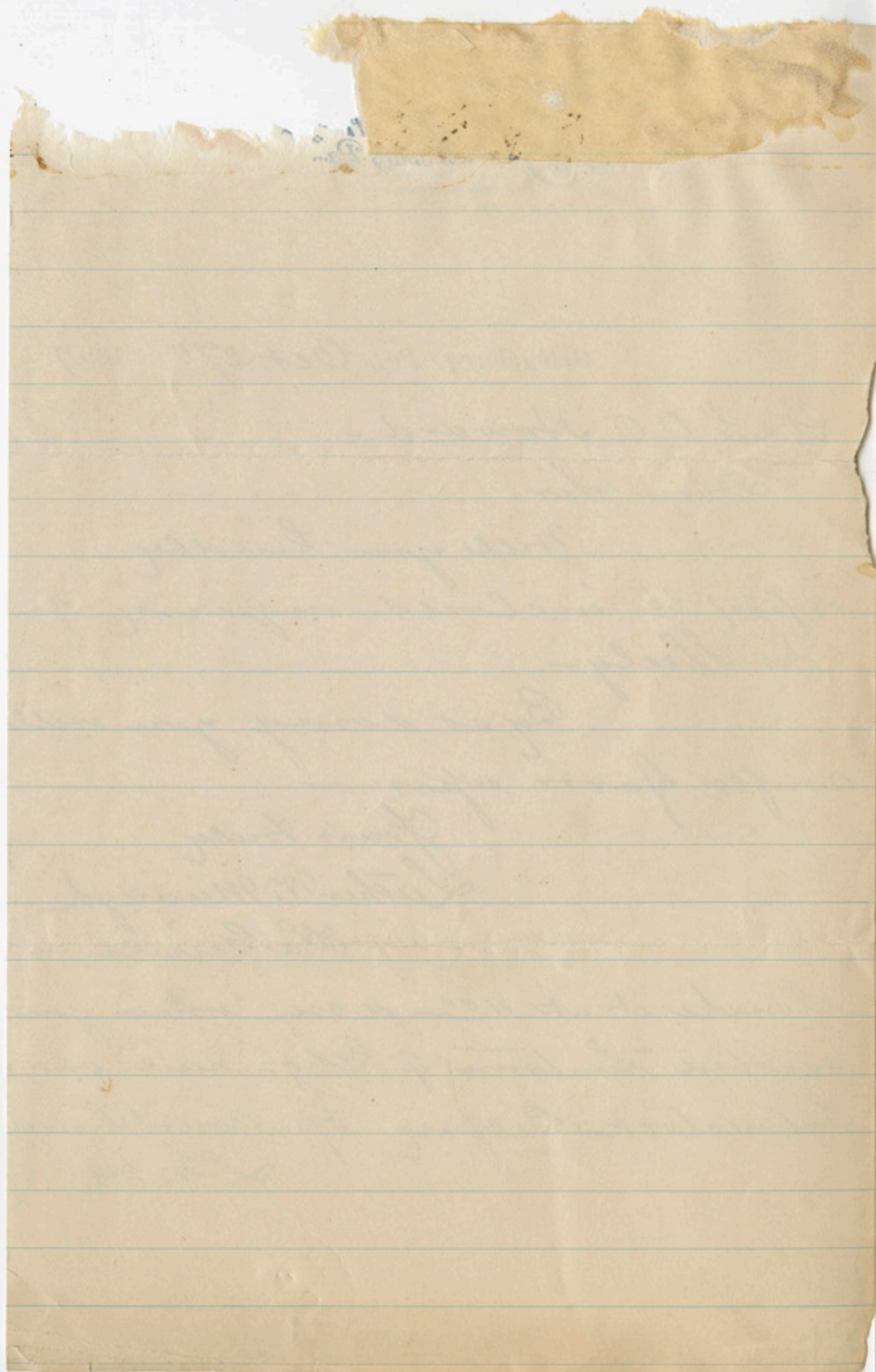

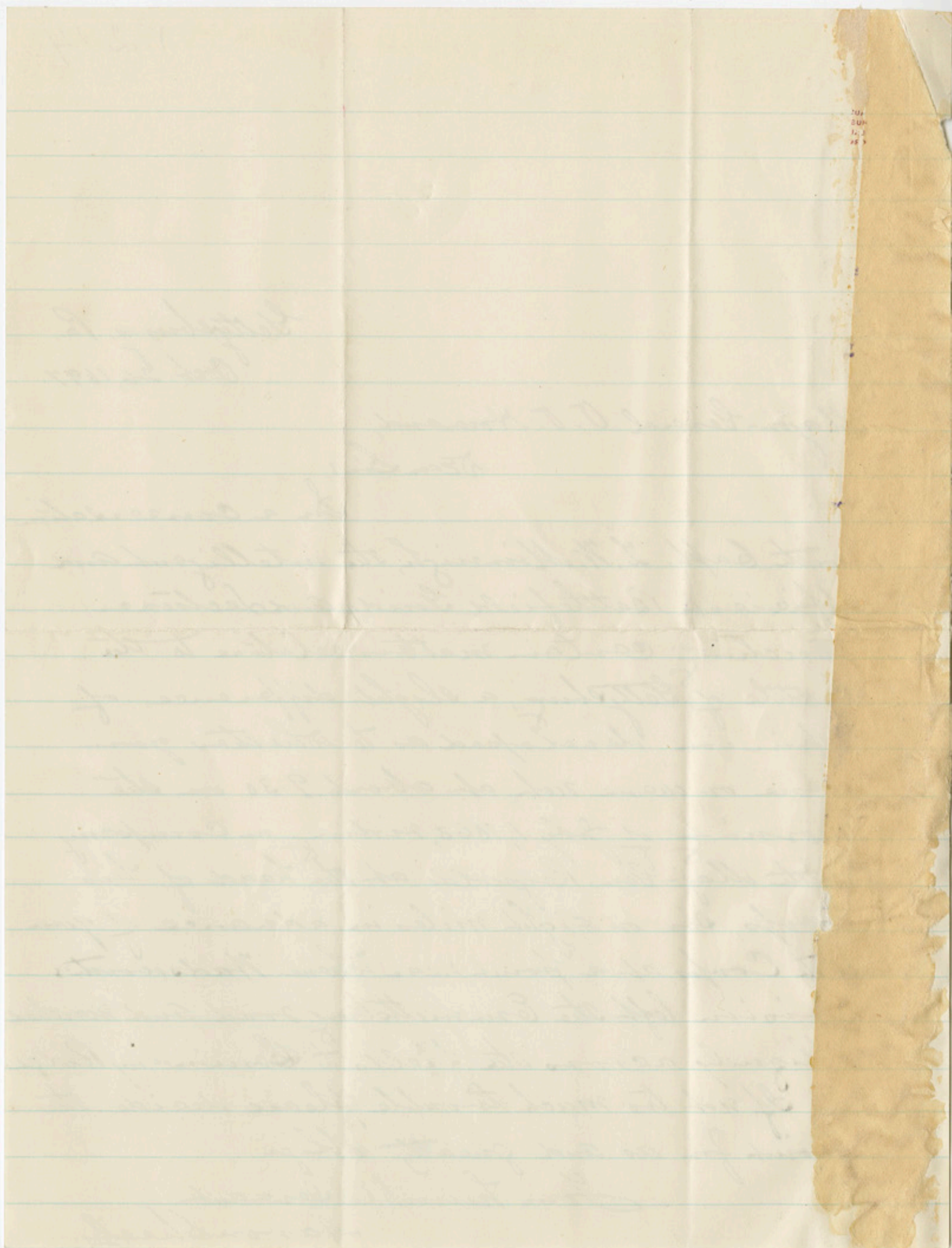

Major-General O. T. Howard,  
Dear Sir:

In a conversation  
with Capt. L. W. Minnigh, the intelligent and  
efficient Battlefield Guide and Sectioner,  
touching certain matters relative to the  
battle of Gettysburg, a slight difference of  
opinion developed as to whether you  
were or were not, at about 9.30 on the  
morning of July 1, 1863, riding in company  
with Maj.-Gen. Reynolds at the head of his  
troops, six or eight miles in advance of your  
11th Corps, at a point near where Hadsoworth's  
Division left the Emmettsburg road and marched  
obliquely across the fields to Seminary Ridge.  
If not too much trouble please decide the  
point for us and greatly oblige
