Dear Brother:-

I want to bespeak your assistance in obtaining justice for a colored man, though to be sure, rather light color, who is a neighbor of mine. He is, I judge, about sixty-five years of age, or perhaps more. I have known him a number of years. He has a carpenter's trade, but is getting rather old and decrepit for doing very much hard work. He is a Christian man and a good citizen in every respect. He lives with his wife at Glencoe. You will see from the enclosed, which I have written to save you all possible trouble, that he served as a teamster, first in connection with Capt. Rumsey's Board of Trade Battery, that is, Battery "B," 1st Ill. Art. This fact we can prove by many witnesses. He had no pay whatever, but did have his food and occasionally a little clothing. Capt. Rumsey is living and remembers him well, but did not seem to know at the time that this man who drove his six mule team for the forage wagon at first, then Battery wagon, was not receiving any pay whatever from the Government. I do not know technically whether he should have been on the rolls of the Battery as an employe or whether he should have been on the rolls of some quartermaster. Perhaps you will know. I suspect that someone drew his pay and defrauded him of it. Capt. Rumsey is a Christian man and a very just man, but he left the service on the 12th of July, 1864, and knew nothing about this case, except that he remembered the man and his service.

Moliere Waters then went into De Gresse's Battery, and you and I remember that very well, but unfortunately I cannot find a single

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have been with you. His full name is Col. I. P. Rumsey, formerly of man, either an officer or enlisted man, who served in that Battery. Battery "B," 1st Ill. Art. There is a report that Capt. De Gresse is dead, and I know no way of Affectionately yours, even verifying that. As kind of a last resort, I have thought of addressing the Secretary of War to get the names from the rolls of De Gresse's Battery; and possibly by writing to them all at their home address, I may find someone who is living and can give the necessary information. Of course, the pay is not a very great amount, but it would be an immense comfort to Waters and his wife in their old age, and besides, I like to see intrinsic justice done to so good a man and patriot. Of course, every one will ask why did he not demand his pay. The answer is, he was only a poor slave, and probably did not understand that he was entitled to anything more than his clothing and food at that time, and that he received. This is what he now says -

Do you not think I could have a bill prepared and obtain for him something from Congress, if we failed to get necessary evidence to establish his claim in the Court of Claims? The latter is rather expensive, and I suspect if we could make a pretty clear case it would be better to put a bill through Congress. What is your advice? I thought it would help to expedite the matter very much if you would write this letter, as I have outlined, to the Secretary of War. If you desire to shorten it or modify it in any way, or add anything yourself, of course you will do so; but I would like to know what your advice is, and what you conclude you can do, if anything. It is not necessary to connect my name with the case I suppose, though I have no objection whatever to having it so connected. Capt. Rumsey you have met. I think he is entitled to the rank of Colonel, and he is a member of our Illinois Commandery of the Loyal Legion. His home is at Lake Forest. He often






