The subject concerning which I write, is the opportunity I desire to serve in the present war, if possible as an Engineer Officer, otherwise in some other branch. Because of my education, experience, age, family, and position, I cannot accept the rank less than Major or Captain. I will not speak of my merits. You know them and they are vouched for by the many letters of recommendation from others able to judge. As I have thus far failed to receive an appointment, I will briefly review the matter.

On May 19th I learned that my name had been mentioned for a commission in the Volunteer Engineers, and I sent a formal application to the Secy. of War for a position as Major or Captain in one of the three volunteer regiments, supplementing this by a further letter stating my qualifications, indorsements, etc. dated May 23rd. To this the Secy. of War answered by personal letter that the application would receive attention as soon as the appointment of officers was taken up. The law required certain rules to be established by the Secy. of War, but before they were established a large number of appointments were made, and since their establishment several have been made without examination, etc. Most of the officers have been selected by the passed by the boards has not received a commission. The First Regiment military boards established to examine candidates, although everyone is complete. Gen. Alger wrote me this a few days ago, stating also

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My conclusion is that there is no opportunity for me to obtain a commission in either of the three regiments. I therefore started my friends working for me on another tack.

On June 30th I addressed an application to Gen. Corbin, Adjt.

Gen., beginning in these words, "General: I have the honor to request
an appointment as a Chief Engineer with the rank of Major, U. S. Volunteers,
to be assigned to duty with one of the army corps, either upon the staff
of one of the corps commanders or with a division commander. As several
such appointments have been made and I am informed there is need of a
few more engineering officers at several division headquarters, I feel
that my request will receive careful attention." I referred to the
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I then wrote letters to important people and friends, asking that they address letters of recommendation to the Adjt. Gen. requesting that I be appointed a "Chief Engineer with the rank of Major, U. S. Volunteers," to serve on the staff of some Major General. The result is that strong letters have gone forward from many persons, including Col. Griffin, the Major of Newark, Col. Pope, C. C. Woolworth, Frank Moss, ex-police commissioner in New York; W. H. Tolman, in charge of United Charities, New York; and others. Senator Sewall has just written me acknowledging my letter of July 1st, in which I stated that the matter could be cleared up and I receive an appointment without interfering with the volunteer regiments, by being made a "Chief Engineer of Major" to serve on staff duty. He adds these words: "I have been very much disappointed indeed by reason of you not getting an appointment, and have referred your letter to the Adjt. Gen."

With my education, experience in southern countries, knowledge of languages, handling of large numbers of men, familiarity with organization of large undertakings, knowledge of routine military drill, etc., coupled with the fact that I have been recommended by a military board for a commission, as stated to me in writing, and because I am indorsed by Vice-Pres. Hobart, Senator Sewall of the Senate Military Committee, Representative Parker, a military man, and Gers. Dodge, Sickles, Stryker, and possibly Ludington, also by Gov. Voorhees, Gen. Plume, Col. Pope, Col. Ehlers, who used to be with you, now Secy. of the Grand Masonic Lodge of New York, and others, men and deserving consideration——with all this there seems to be nothing more for me to do but inform you that I have done everything possible on the basis of merit and influence of men who know me and have a right to speak and be heard. I have not yet

exhausted these channels, but I do not desire to flood the Adjt. Gen. with quantities of letters. The score or more which have been sent have rather represented quality from military, political, and civil life. I have an extended personal acquaintance of more than 2000 people throughout the U. S., and selected from them a few representative ones. I shall cease having more letters sent to the War Dept.

It would be an honor to myself and family and to you, if I could serve as a Chief Engineer with the rank of Major, U. S. Volunteers, on the staff of one of the Major Generals. I would prefer that, to commanding in one of the regiments, and firmly believe that as soon as who appointed I could quickly find one of the Generals would gladly have me with him. I would give a good account of myself to him and the Govt.

I have repeatedly asked you to refrain from working in my behalf until I was satisfied that all other assistance would not fully suffice, coupled with a desire to be admitted on merit. But I regret to say that two months effort on the part of myself and the gentlemen above mentioned have failed, and I now ask that you take such steps as you deem best to learn whether or not I will be commissioned or definitely set aside.

You are at liberty to show this letter to whom you desire.

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




