



Dear General: -

I have received your letter of the 22nd inst.enclosing a list of fifty addresses of your friends and \$1.00 for postage. I send to you by separate wrapper a copy of the Advance of the 25th inst. In this you will find your letter and also the interview which Dr. Adams had, as well as a paragraph from the editor, Dr. Thain, regarding your letter. Your letter has not yet appeared in the Interior. Dr. Gray is expected home to-morrow. I showed the letter in the Advance to your brother and told him of the plan that we had to have similar letters published in other papers. He asked me to suggest to you sending a letter to Rev. Dr. Henry M. Field, editor of the Evangelist, in New York, or, in his absence to Dr. Otis F. Presbrey, business manager, referring to your work as "under Presbyterian and other evangelical auspices".
