I received your letter, appealing the case of Capt. J. I. Wileson to the Secretary of the Interior. I will fill in the name of the regiment, company, etc, and forward a copy of the letter prepared, for you, addressed to Hon. H. Clay Evans, Commissioner of Pensions, which I suppose you signed andsent to the Pension office. You were to fill in the date. It was sent from here on or about June 18, 1897.

I never knew positively whether yousent it to the commissioner or not at that time. Harry once wrote me, or some clerk in your office, in your absence, that he supposed you forwarded it soon after it arrived, but that it never was recorded. That letter, a copy of which I will inclose herewith, gave all the necessary data. I simply forward it for your information and to be retained by you, as a copy of your former letter, which I now forward directly to Hon. Webster Davis, Asst Secretiary of the Interior.

Capt. Wilson's regiment was the $36 t h$ Illinois Volunteer Infantry; he was Capt of Company "C" and he served in Gen'l Stanley's Division of the 4 th army corps under your command; was an exceptionally good company officer. He became deaf before leaving the army but the deafness grew upon him. According to the Surgeon of his regiment, this deafness and diseased state of his nervous system, was the result of a severe illness, which you know about, and that severe illness was chiefly the resuit of his being lost in the swamps of Arkansas when he came near starveing to death, and was greatly exposed in the rainy weather without sherter and without blankets. He was cared for by the colored people.

Dear Sir:-
I have the honor to ask your attention to the inclosed application for Widow's pension by Mrs. Josephine M. Wilson, of Chicago. I knew her husband, the late Capt. James I. Wilson of Company "C," 36th Illinois Volunteer Infantry. That regiment was in my command in the Fourth Army Corps, Army of the Cumberland. I do not need to identify him, as he had for some years received a pension before his death as referred to in irs. Wilson's application. Capt. Wilson was associated for some years with my brother in business, and was almost totally deaf and as stated by Surgeon Pierce of his regiment, this deafness and a diseased state of the ne rvous system was plainly the result of his severe illness while in the military service. In support of this fact, and also of the fact that his death resulted from the same causes and is directDy traceable to his suffering and hard service in the campaigns in Misesour and Arkansas, I invite a careful examination of the affidavit of Dr. Sam'l K. Crawford, formerly Surgeon of the 50th Ohio Vol. Inf. Dr. crawford is still a well-known physician in chicago, and held important positions as a staff surgeon, I an told, as well as surgeon of the 50th Ohio Vol. Inf. Dr. Crawford states that he knew Capt. Wilson in 1865, and that it was evident at that time that the impaired functional operations of his brain and nervous system had resulted from exposures in the swamps of Arkansas, and resulting sickness.

Dr. Crawford further states that he had known Capt. Wilson from the date mentioned in 1865 until the time of his death, and that he never re-

2-
covered his health subsequent to the Battle of Pea Ridge until the date of his death, June 12 th, 1894.

Dr. Crawford states that it is his firm conviction that the death of Capt. Wilson was the direct result of his army exposures and the resultant diseases, all contracted while in the line of military duty.

I submit that this affidavit of a we $l l$ known and reputable citizen of the United States and a late prominent officer in our volunteer army supplies ground for reversing the decision made by a former commissioner to the effect that Capt. Wilson did not die from diseases resulting from his military service.

I ask attention still further to the affidavit of Dr. William P. Peirce, late Assistant Surgeon of the 26 th Ill. Vol. Inf., who was officially connected with the regiment at the time catt. Wilson served in it, to the effect that the diseases contracted during that service produce a permanent impairment of the functions of his brain and nervous system. A copy of this affidavit of Dr. William P. Pierce is submitted herewith, but I am credibly informed that the original is on file in your office. I scarcely need to add that I have no interest whatever in this claim, except to do justive to a late comrade whom I knew personally, and to his widow, who is in every way worthy and deserving of justice in this matter of her application for a widow's pension.
