The frequent repetition of your name and personal reminiscences are not what the public expect in an introduction to a book, the title of which embraces the word "fighting."


I think that Dr. Martyn's illness may have prevented him doing what otherwise he might have given, as to be frank with you, the introduction is not satisfactory to me.


