#### PREAMBLE.

In order to promote the preservation of those kind and fraternal feelings which have bound together with the strong cords of love and affection the comrades in arms of many battles, sieges, marches and cruises, the Soldiers and Sailors of the Union Army and Navy during the War of the Rebellion, do form and adopt this constitution.

#### CONSTITUTION.

#### ARTICLE I.-NAME.

This organizatian shall be known as the Jackson County Veteran Association of Jackson County, Iowa.

#### ARTICLE II.-OF MEMBERSHIP

Sec 1. Soldiers and Sailors who were regularly mustered into the service of the United States during the War of the Rebellion and honorably discharged, shall become members of the Association upon signifying their desire to do so; *Provided*, that enrollment of a person who has been convicted of crime or is notoriously of immoral character, may be deferred by a majority vote until the Association is satisfied that he has reformed.

Sec. 2. Membership can be terminated only by death; but for crime or other conduct unbecoming a comrade, a member may be suspended by a two-thirds vote of the Association at a meeting of which every member shall have been notified. A suspended member may be reinstated by a two-thirds vote of a meeting of which all members shall have had notice.

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The officers of the Association shall consisist of a Commander, Sr. and Jr. Vice Commanders, Adjutant Quartermaster, Commissary Color Sergeant, and Chaplain, who shall be chosen by ballot by a majority vote of the Association, and hold their offices for one year or until their successors are duly installed. Officers of the Day, Officers of the Guard, Guards, Orderlies and such other officers as may be necessary for the transaction of business, may be detailed by the Commander from time to time as required.

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Sec. t. For occasions of parade, ceremony or drill, the powers and duties of the officers shall assimilate to regimental rank in the U. S. Army; and they shall be obeyed and respected accordingly.

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 The duties of the Commander shall be essentially those of a presiding officer.

2. The duties of the Vice Commanders shall be those

usually devolving upon vice presidents, and they shall take precedence in order of rank.

3. The duties of the Adjutant shall be essentially those of the secretary. He shall be the historian of the Association and shall carefully arrange and preserve all records, writings and other data, pertaining to the War of the Rebellion, that may be given him by members of the Association and others for that purpose.

4. The Quartermaster shall perform the duties usually appertaining to a treasurer and shall have general supervision of all accounts and disbursements.

5. The Commissary shall have general supervision of arrangements for banquets or picnics of the Association, and perform such other duties as the Association or Commander may require.

6. The Color Sergeant shall have charge of such flags, badges, uniforms, decorations and other property (except money and books) that the Association may become possessed of.

Members of the Association shall be known and hailed as "Comrades."

#### ARTICLE V - OF MEETINGS.

The Association hold an annual meeting or reunion at a place designated by vote of the Association. The date of such reunion shall be decided by the officers of the Association.

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The expenses of the Association shall be defrayed by voluntary contributions and the sale of badges at the annual reunions.

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If a member of this Assoctation should remove from Jackson County, he will cease to be an active member and need not be notified of meetings, but such members will be expected to provide that this Association be informed of the date of their death for preservation in the records.

#### ARTICLE VIII.

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#### ARTICLE IX .- AMENDMENTS.

This constitution may be amended at the regular annual meeting of the Association by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

Dear General:-

Your letter of the 23rd inst. has been received. It finds me just recovering from a siege of brain fever. I am out of bed again but have not yet left the house.

I am much pleased to hear that you are confident of succeeding in paying off the indebtedness of the Four Seasons property. The abstract is a much larger one than are usually handled. I worked on it nine weeks myself and had the assistance of four other people a good part of that time. There are six bound volumes and accompanying these volumes are a large box of onewspapers and a roll of maps and plats. You will see that making a copy would be a tedious matter. Furthermore, a lawyer undertaking to make an examination can be saved a great deal of time if I can review the abstract with him. In this way the examination can probably be made in three days; but otherwise a lawyer might consume two or three weeks and then not be clear as to some points. As I am thoroughly familiar with every part of it, I could probably make numerous points clear to him in a few minutes to which he might alone devote much more time. The entire property is made up of smaller tracts, the title to which came through various separate chains and to one unfamiliar with the subject it is tedious to trace all these out, notwithstanding the fact that the abstract is systematically prepared. The abstract shows complete title, and there can be no question about this, excepting that there are two suits, one for a thousand dollars and another for about twelve hundred dollars, which have not been adjusted. But the people at Louisville have agreed to stand good for these.

If an examination of the abstract has to be made with a view to satisfying prospective donors, I suggest that you have me come with the abstract. I take it that you can get transportation for me over one of the roads between Chicago and **and** New York.

During the past few months I have done some of my own work and earned some money in this way. I did this, first, because my family had to be fed and clothed and because there did not seem to be anything to take hold of in connection with the University. As I understood it, my duties were clearly restricted

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to assisting you by correspondence and it seemed to be impractical to do anything in this line as long as we were separated by the distance between Chicago and New York. I have not, however, forgotten the interests of the University. This matter has been foremost in my mind at all times, and I have all along tried to find an opportunity to do something in a line which would not interfere with what you and Mr.Fairchild were trying to do. The strain which I have been under for a year or more has, no doubt, been the cause of myx sickness. I am mending fast and expect to be out by the end of this week.

Lately a friend has given me suggestions for soliciting the assistance of some influential people who are entirely out of the line of those among whom you are working and I have been expecting to look after this matter next month. If I should go to New York I can tell you fully about it, and possibly you may think it best to go with me. The other day I had a letter from Dr.Leland, in which he intimates that his matter may yet come to fomething favorable for us.

You have learned. I presume, that Dr.Pearsons has finished with Berea. I believe that if our organization were now in such a state as to commend itself for stability, the Dr. would make us an offer. I have not talked with him for two or three months.
